**ISTHMIAN WORKING HER WAY TO PORT**

San Diego, Cal., Dec. 19.—Conveyed by the cruiser West Virginia, the destroyer Perry and naval tug Iroquois, the freighter Isthmian, which ran on a reef off San Benito island yesterday, was limping towards San Diego today. At daylight she was a little more than 100 miles out of this port. At her present rate of speed she should reach here this afternoon.

The Isthmian, carrying a crew of 40 and laden with a cargo of California products, is in a serious condition. Her bow is submerged and her hold flooded with water. The Isthmian was expected to founder any time last night, when her pumps went out of commission and it was found that the ship's bottom had been torn away in hole No. 1.

Captain Rye, jettisoned almost 2000 barrels of fuel oil, which raised the vessel, and she was able to continue her slow journey to this port.
