AID FOR NORMAL
NOT LIKELY GIVEN

Appropriation of \$50,000 Will Have
Much Opposition in Legislature.

(Independence Mailer.)
The State Normal at Monmouth ought to have another school building and its board of regents will ask the legislature for \$50,000 with which to build it. The chances are not very good that the legislature will make the appropriation. Although defeated at the last election, south and east Oregon have not given up hopes of securing normals for their sections and it is not likely that representatives from those sections will consent to further building up the institution at Monmouth. This and the fact that the next legislature is evidently going to be strong for "economy" does not favor the State Normal's chances for an appropriation.
