# **DELINQUENT TAXES**

#### Is \$1,874,735 Exclusive of Multnomah, Coos and **Curry Counties**

Exclusive of the counties of Coos, Curry and Multaomah, from which no reports have been received, the total amount of delinquent taxes on the tax rolls of the several counties of the state on September 30, 1914, according to a statement issued by the accountancy department of the office of Insurance Commissioner Fergusen, was \$1,874,735. taxes listed \$1,276,130,52 is from the 1913 assessment rolls. The realty taxes delinquent, including the 1913 rolls, amounts to \$983,309.82; personal taxes, \$249,176,56; not segregated in reports as between real and personal, \$652,249.

According to this report tae amonot of delinquent taxes on the 1913 tax roll for Marion county, on September 20 of this year, was 864,105.81. In checking up the records of the officers of the several counties, the expert accountants in the employ of the state accountancy department, classified definquent taxes as assets, and failure to collect them is charpeable to the delinquency of the tax collectors of the several counties. This is Insurance Commissioner Ferguson's interputation of the status of delinquent taxes, although one of the courts for Multuomal county disagrees with him on this point, county disagrees with him on this point, and if there taxes are allowed to run for a period of esven years after becom-ing delinquent they become ortlawed and operate as a dead loss to the tax
