KILLED TURKISH LEADER. Cairo, Egypt, Jan. 1.—The murder Christmas day of Djemal Pasha, Turkish military commander at Jeddah, was reported here today by refugees just arrived from the Ottoman port. Djemal arrived the day before he was killed, it was stated, with 3000 miserably equipped troops, to assume charge of Jeddah's defense. The next morning he was found dead at his hotel.

London.—The steamship sunk in the North sea Thursday by a mine was identified as the M. C. Holl, Danish, cotton laden Savannah to Christiania and it was announced the crew was saved.

BOARD WILL TAKE NO ACTION JUST NOW The state board of highway commissioners, composed of the governor, secretary of state and state treasurer, this morning received the formal protest of the Taxpayers' league of Columbia county against the cost of constructing the Pacific highway through that county and protesting against the reapportionment of State Highway Engineer W. H. Bowley. Engineer Bowley is charged with incompetency and extravagance in the expenditure of the road funds, and the petitioners ask that he be removed from the office. Engineer Bowley is serving during the pleasure of the state highway commission and the members of the commission will take no action upon the petition until the next regular meeting. Petitioners represent that Engineer Bowley misrepresented the estimated cost of the proposed surveys and road construction in the county, which allegation Mr. Bowley stoutly denies and maintains that he made no representations to the taxpayers of Columbia or any other county outside of his authority or duty as outlined under the law.

BAD RAILROAD WRECK. London, Jan. 1.—Ten persons were killed and 50 injured in a rear-end collision at Hford today between a London-bound express train and a local on the Great Eastern railroad. The local train was waiting on a siding when it was struck and the victims were passengers in the rear car. Most of them were commuters.
