days before said final vote.

Rule 44a.
Appropriation bills introduced in the House shall not carry several different items not closely associated for the same purpose, and no general appropriation bill carrying numerous items for dissimilar and non-related purposes shall be considered; that all appropriation bills shall be reported by the Committee on Ways and Means or any other committee as early as possible in the session, and in no case later than the twentieth day of the session without the consent of a majority of the members of the House. Immediately upon being reported to the House for a third reading, they shall take precedence over all other bills and shall be on the top of the calendar until disposed of.

Rule 44b.
If a bill is amended in committee and the report adopted the amendments shall be printed and posted in the bill book of the members before the bill comes up for final passage. All bills originating in the Senate which shall reach the House in amended form shall be reprinted and posted in the bill book of the members if said bill shall come on for final passage in the House.

Rule 44c.
Any bill which amends an existing law of the State of Oregon shall have the new matter to be inserted into the Act printed in italics, the old portion of the statute to be in ordinary print, and the portions to be stricken out to be set off in brackets or marked across with a line so as to be legible to the members.

By the decisive vote of 21 to 7, the senate went on record yesterday afternoon as being diametrically opposed to the contract system of disposing of the clerical help problem during the present session. It does not mean, however, that the upper branch of the assembly has put its stamp of approval upon the system that was in practice at the last session, which proved so expensive, as the question only came up upon the contract proposition which the majority members did not deem applicable to the employment of clerical assistants, when efficiency is the most vital point to be taken into consideration.

The question came up in the senate upon a senate version resolution, introduced by Charles H. Blackman, providing that a committee be appointed, composed of three members of the senate, including the president and one from the house, including the speaker, to go for bids for the furnishing of all clerical assistance for both branches of the legislature. The resolution was reported back by the resolutions committee unanimously. Senator Blackman made an indefinite postponement and the fight was on. The current developed a spirited debate with Senators Linn, Farrell, Ragsdale and Wood in favor of the resolution, and Senators Klingman, Butler, Hoyer and Vinton opposed. The following result when the final roll was taken: the question of indefinite postponement.

Reports That Russia Secured Morgan Loan

New York, Jan. 12.—Reports that Russia had secured a loan of \$12,000,000 from J. P. Morgan & Co. were widely circulated here today. At the Morgan office it was stated that the matter was purely a commercial transaction designed to facilitate Russian credit in the United States.

"Russia," said a member of the firm, "desires to expand sums for purchasing supplies in the open market, and usually arranged for a credit loan through our company. Our action complied fully with the terms of federal reserve law. All the money will remain in the United States."
