HENRY CLEWS' WEEKLY FINANCIAL LETTER

New York, Jan. 9, 1915.

The first week of the new year has shown no diminution of the recuperative influences observed in our previous advices. The war is still the dominating factor, and must continue until peace is in sight. No great changes in this respect appear to be anticipated until military preparations are energized by the approach of spring. For the time being the contending armies are at a deadlock, which can only be broken by vigorous fresh initiative.

The London Stock Exchange reopened Transactions there have been relatively unimportant owing to the numerous restrictions still imposed. London, however, seems to be thoroughly adjusted to war conditions.

The effect of the war upon its security markets is shown in the fact that the total new British issues for the year amounted to about \$512,000,000, against \$196,000,000, a year ago. The figures for 1914 included the war loan of \$332,000,000, but not the \$77,000,000 of treasury bills.

Of the new issues \$51,000,000 went to British possessions, \$12,000,000 to Russia, \$35,000,000 to other European countries and \$10,000,000 to the United States. Last year British investments in the United States were about \$18,000,000 and the year before \$23,000,000. Outside of war loans, the largest single field for British investments continues to be railroads, especially in India and Canada.

The total issues of new capital in the principal states of this country in 1914 amounted to \$1,435,000,000, compared with \$1,645,000,000 for the previous year, a decrease of \$209,000,000. These new issues for 1914 include \$648,000,000 for bonds, \$525,000,000 for notes and \$262,000,000 for stocks. The changes indicate an increase of \$120,000,000 in railroad bonds and notes, but a decrease of \$66,000,000 in railroad stocks. In industrial corporations there was a decline in all issues amounting to \$10,000,000 in bonds, \$51,000,000 in notes and \$123,000,000 in stocks. These figures show conclusively the depressing effect of the continued attacks upon business interests by the various legislative bodies.

It is quite evident that at present our industrial activities are not keeping pace with the natural growth of the country. Enterprise has been checked. Capital is relatively idle, and must be accumulating in spite of diminished profits in many lines of industries. As confidence is restored enterprise will revive, capital will come out of hiding and the investment situation should gradually improve. Although the usual January investment demand has not yet materialized, there are indications of coming revival. One mark of recovery is the important new issues announced this week by the St. Paul and the Pennsylvania railroad systems. Both of these organizations are about to put out important notations, which they would not be apt to do unless in their opinion the situation was favorable.

Another indication of reviving confidence is the increasing orders placed by the railroads for rails, cars and other materials. This changed attitude on part of railroad managers is no doubt largely due to the concessions recently granted by the interstate commerce commission, and the belief that that body has moderated its long-continued attitude of hostility. As railroad earnings continue very unsatisfactory, this display of confidence on the part of railroad managers is doubly assuring. So far as the steel industry is concerned the volume of orders is still very small and prices are so low that profits must be nominal. Nevertheless, the disposition of the railroads, the largest and shrewdest buyers of steel, to enter the market at this time, is a positive exhibition of confidence in the future.

Money continues very easy to good borrowers, and funds are now returning from the interior with increased freedom. There is a continued surplus of currency, which, however, is being slowly counteracted by retirement of the emergency issue under the Aldrich-Vreeland act. A further break in foreign exchange to the lowest figure since 1907 was also a favorable indication, being chiefly due to a larger supply of foodstuffs and cotton which are now going outward in large quantities.

A sharp advance occurred in wheat owing to foreign buying. This means increasing profits for the western farmer and also serves to increase the export of wheat for the month of December which for the month of December are expected to reach about \$110,000,000. The situation, therefore, is in favor of gold imports rather than exports, and the shipment this week to Paris must be regarded as a special transaction. Gold might come from Canada but is virtually at a premium, and none of the European nations will part with the precious metal.

The tendency of prices on the New York Stock Exchange was slightly reactionary. Some disappointment is shown at the absence of the usual January investment demand, and a possible moderate offering of stocks on foreign account acted as a check to the upward movement for the present in this market. This is particularly true of international shares, but the effect is also detrimental to the whole market. Strength is largely confined to a few specialties, particularly those likely to be benefited by the war. General trade at home continues quiet. Consumers show a universal tendency toward economy, which materially affects business and adds to the number of unemployed. This is the season also when out-of-door employment is at a minimum. The best conditions are found in the grain region where farmers are obtaining war prices for their wheat. Conversely, the poorest conditions are found in the south, where the war has caused sharp contraction in the demand for cotton in face of a record crop. Cotton, however, is now going forward with more freedom and its low price has at least

some relief.

Governor Takes Up Official Duties After Inauguration

The first official act of Governor Withycombe, after taking the oath of office, reading his first message to the legislature and returning to the executive chambers, was to write a letter of acceptance of state representation of the National Red Cross society, which was directed to Elmer T. Bickner, of New York City; congratulating the society upon the great work that is being accomplished in supporting suffering humanity and expressing the hope that he will be able to be of some assistance. His second official act was to appoint R. A. Booth, of Eugene, as his official representative upon the occasion of the opening of the Panama-Pacific exposition at San Francisco, on February 20.

Ohio Coal Mines Will Be Reopened in the Morning

Wheeling, W. Va., Jan. 13.—All coal mines in eastern Ohio, where 16,000 men are now on strike, will be reopened at 7 a. m. tomorrow, it was announced here today. The operators also asserted that all strikers failing to return to work will be evicted from company houses.

The miners quit work ten months ago when their demands for higher wages were rejected.

served to lessen the difficulties of the domestic manufacturer. Our foreign trade is steadily improving and Europe needs purchases of food, cotton and war material are constantly increasing. There is an awkward scarcity of freight room resulting from the war, but the high rates are likely to attract new tonnage and cure this difficulty quicker than any artificial relief.

Notwithstanding war the United States is in an exceedingly strong position from either the economic or the financial standpoint. This year we will get little or no European capital. We will be obliged to finance our own requirements, and perhaps lend some assistance to Europe. Our indebtedness over there is already practically paid, and we are fortunate in this respect. Canada and Argentina have already come to New York for financial assistance, and others will follow. This may be flattering to our financial pride, but these ventures into new fields will have to be tried with discretion.

Polk County Model School Attracts National Attention

More honors for the Oregon school system and public school equipment. In a number of instances in the past Oregon's school system has received honorable mention and has been set up as a model by the highest authorities upon educational matters in the United States, and now the state is to be heralded throughout the universe as having one of the best model rural school buildings in the United States. Having read the press notices of the model rural school building to be exhibited at the Panama-Pacific exposition with full descriptions covering the same, the editor of the School Board Journal, of Milwaukee, Wisconsin, has written for photographs of the original and also for the name of the architect, in order that the school may be described in the next issue of that journal, which is the largest educational publication in the United States. This model school is located in Polk county, at Fall Bridge, about four miles west of Dallas. This school has been selected and advertised by J. C. Muerman, head of the Washington bureau of education, as one of the two best model rural schools in the United States in the pamphlet issued regularly by the department.

JUDGE KELLY TO ASSUME ROLE OF ACCOUNTANT

Case of Davis versus Ransom Requires Ruling on Accounting and Bookkeeping of Parties.

Judge Percy B. Kelly, of department Number 1 of the circuit court of this county has been compelled to assume the role of expert accountant and will spend some time delving into the bookkeeping accounts offered as exhibits in the case of J. C. Davis against J. T. Ransom which was heard in this department yesterday evening. The case is purely a matter of accounting and the books date from December 10, 1913, to November 1914. It appears that employees of the defendant were allowed to make purchases at the store of the plaintiff, and their store bills were deducted from their wages. The controversy arose over the accounts in the final settlement. The plaintiff alleges that there is still due \$684.96 and the defendant alleges that about one half of this sum is due. The case was heard without a jury and the matter taken under advisement by Judge Kelly. W. C. Winslow is appearing for the plaintiff and Jeffrey and Lennan of Portland for the defendants.

WOULD PROVIDE HOME FOR THEIR UNEMPLOYED

"Hotel de Gink" Bill Introduced by State Senate of Washington by Labor Party Leader.

Olympia, Wash., Jan. 13.—A "Hotel de Gink" bill made its appearance in the senate today when Senator Campbell, of Snohomish, asked for an appropriation of \$250,000 for the establishment of dormitories in various parts of the state as homes for the unemployed and needy.

Chamberlain is the recognized leader of the senate. The bill provides for a commission to handle the funds, consisting of a senator, representative, state official, business men and a member of a labor union.

Oregon Ordered to Prepare For Journey Through Canal

Bremerton, Wash., Jan. 13.—The historic battleship Oregon, which will lead the naval vessels through the Panama canal on the occasion of the formal opening of the big water way, is under orders detaching her from the reserve fleet and ordering her to proceed to San Diego, stopping at San Francisco for coal and stores. Post repair trials of the engine are to be held in the way down. The Oregon will, it is thought, be able to leave the navy yard here Friday.

Another Jesse James Gets a Sentence For Hold Up

San Francisco, Jan. 13.—Jesse James, convicted of highway robbery before Superior Judge Dwyer, was sentenced today to ten years in San Quentin prison.

October 20, James and a companion attempted to hold up a messenger en route from Panama to Seattle to the Bank of Italy with \$1,000 to deposit.

TWO BATTLESHIPS

Washington, Jan. 13.—The house naval committee today agreed to recommend the construction of two battleships next year, thereby defeating the "little navy" advocates.

The committee also recommended the construction of 10 coast defense submarines, eight of which will be assigned to duty on the Pacific coast; one carrying submarine, six destroyers, one hospital ship, one transport and one oiler.
