ERVIN SPRINGER IS STILL MISSING

Man Who Disappeared Last
Saturday Still Object of
Search

No trace has been found today of Ervin V. Springer, the bookkeeper of the Marion hotel, who disappeared from his home on 1593 South Commercial street Saturday afternoon, and it is feared by the anxious parents of the young man that he has met with foul play or has become delirious and wandered off.

He had been feeling badly for a few days and came home Friday night with a severe cold and spent most of the day Saturday in bed. In the afternoon he called up Clerk Holcomb, of the Marion, his business partner and associate, and told him that he was feeling better and that he was coming down town to see a doctor. He said that he would drop in at the Marion before he went to see the doctor, and has not been seen since.

The police have been notified and are looking for any trace that might be followed. He had no business worries so far as known, and his accounts at the Marion are in first-class shape, according to Mr. Crowe. There can be no cause given for his disappearance except that his illness might have caused him to become delirious.

Dallas May Secure Another Sawmill

There is a possibility of Dallas getting another sawmill in the not very distant future. The Great Western company, now operating at Black Rock, has a small tract of timber up the La Crosse river, and can secure additional stumpage, and it is with a view of cutting this that the company is considering the advisability of erecting a sawmill here. The site of the old Spaulding mill has been offered the Great Western. In case the company inaugurates operations at this point, a railroad will be built into the timber. The whole matter as yet is simply under consideration. What the outcome will be is only conjecture—Observer.

Washington, Jan. 13—Assistant United States Attorney General Wallace ordered United States District Attorney Karsh, at Danville, Ill., this afternoon to investigate alleged frauds in the November election in "Uncle Joe" Cannon's district.

Wallace and the investigation was ordered so that Karsh could make a full report to the department of justice on charges of alleged election frauds in Illinois.
