SENATOR SMOOT MAKES NEW RECORD

Speaks For Eleven Hours Without Break Against Pending Shipping Bill

Washington, Jan. 20.—After an all-night filibuster in the senate against the government ship purchase bill, Senator Reed Smoot, of Utah, at 9:25 a. m. yielded the floor to his colleague, Senator Sutherland. Smoot had spoken continuously 11 hours and 35 minutes.
During the long night session Smoot talked constantly on the general subject of shipping. He did not use the time-killing methods ordinarily adopted to furnish sufficient language to retain the floor. His performance was one of the most remarkable in the history of the senate in this regard.

Keeping Up Fight Today.

Washington, Jan. 20.—Fighting hard to defeat the government ship purchase bill now pending in the senate, republican members of the upper house this afternoon continued their filibuster against the measure. At 2:30 p. m. the senate had been in continuous session since early Friday, with no sign of adjournment. At that hour three republican senators had been able to hold the floor continuously from shortly before 10 o'clock last night.

They were Senators Smoot and Sutherland, of Utah, and Senator Lodge, of Massachusetts. Smoot carried the burden during the weary hours of the night until Sutherland relieved him at 9:35. Lodge relieved Sutherland at noon and immediately launched into a bitter criticism of President Wilson.
"I deeply regret," said Lodge sarcastically, "that the president's secretary was not present. I think it would be well, since congress has been converted into a mere register of the president's will, that there should be some visible symbol of his authority present. "It is too much to expect the president to be here himself, so while the watchful writer keeps his eye on the red panoramas of Mexico, he should have a representative to see that no lambs stray from the fold."
Referring to Senator Fletcher's recent speech in which he charged that a lobby was working against the bill Lodge said he had seen representatives of the foreign steamship companies present repeatedly while the immigration bill was under consideration.
"I don't know whether the ship interests are interested in this bill or not," he said, "but I do not know that I would deny their right to be here if they were interested. It would not occur to me that the bill was promoted because the agent of the Hamburg-American line, which has numerous interlined ships to sell, was in Washington last week. It would not occur to me to suggest that Paul Warburg, a member of the organization of the reserve board, was a director of the Hamburg line. Yet every time there is serious opposition to an administration measure, the old charge of a lobby is brought forward."
Senator Overman expressed the opinion this afternoon that the session of the senate probably would end at midnight and that there would be no Sunday session.

ONE DAY'S COURT NEWS.

The imposition of sentence upon M. Silver, convicted of the crime of arson, which was to have been pronounced by Judge Kelly this morning, was postponed until 10 o'clock Wednesday, February 3, upon motion of Attorney John A. Carson, for the defendant. Attorney Carson stated this morning that he was endeavoring to secure a parole from the bench for his client and that to further this end he was circulating a petition among the jurymen in the case. Mr. Carson stated that he had been unable to reach all of the jurymen, as a number of them left the city as soon as they were discharged and that he had only seven names on the petition. He asked that the imposition of sentence be deferred until he had had a chance to see the other jurymen and make a showing in the court Wednesday.

An appeal from the decision of the county court appointing a guardian of the estate of S. T. Northcutt, of Turner, was filed in the circuit court today and the case entitled S. T. Northcutt against Eva Palmerton and E. M. Croisan, guardian. The case was heard in the county court December 28 and Judge Bushy appointed a guardian over Mr. Northcutt's estate. It appeared from the testimony of witnesses at the trial that Mr. Northcutt was 78 years of age and had been duped by confidence men in the recent past and Mrs. Eva Palmerton, his daughter, petitioned that he be enjoined from purchasing some eastern real estate which he announced as his intention.
