### LARGEST AUDIENCE OF WEEK OUT LAST NIGHT

### Dr. Ostrom Makes Address On "The Modern Liberal Religion"

The largest audience of the week greeted Dr. Ostrom last night at the tabernacle to hear his address on "The Modern Liberal Religion". Speaking of the liberalist in religion who advances the theory that man is an undeveloped creature he said "I couldn't submit to a liberalist in religion. The theory is too narrow. I must prefer the Bible theory for it everywhere makes out that man is a great creature, and though he becomes a great sinner, he has a great Saviour and there is promised for him a great salvation."

"If you were brought before a jury," he continued, "for trial, which would you prefer, a verdict of being a semi-imbecile, undeveloped and irresponsible, or of being a guilty sinner capable of being pardoned?" You see the theory is too narrow to suit me. I'm a great sinner but I've got a great Saviour with a great salvation. "In the Bible man is called a great creature; in the laws given him his greatness is implied and in exact and definite declaration of the scriptures he is great for it says 'Thou hast made him a little lower than God.' Man is so great he can think around the world in less than a minute; he can be so calm that apparently nothing could rattle him, and the next minute he acts like a fiend."

"And then," he continued, "there is a tendency now-days to declare that there is no sin, but the very man who says that locks his door at night, takes a receipt when he pays a bill, and finds it necessary to guard the virtue of his daughter. They tell us there is an angel in every man. It's strange that some of them don't hate."

"They say there is good in all religions. Yes but there is a great deal that's bad and if you have a glass of water in one hand and enough poison in the other hand to kill a man, don't mix them and drink the water. There are lots of religions, lots of theories and lots of attempts to produce religions but there is only one Jesus."

Proceeding the sermon reports were made by people who had attended the prayer meetings in the homes and in the public service at the First Methodist church. In one prayer meeting four people made their first decision to live the Christian life; at two other homes several people who the night before had made the public declaration in the tabernacle took part in the prayer service and prayed in public for the first time. Many other encouraging reports were also given showing that the day of prayer was successful beyond the expectation of those who planned it.

Tonight in the tabernacle a special service will be held for all young people between the ages of about 15 and 25 and the center section of seats will be reserved for them until 7:45 p. m. All other people are invited to come and are asked to occupy seats on the side sections. Dr. Ostrom has announced his subject for the young people "What Do I Live For."

Tickets were also distributed last night announcing the special song service for Saturday night and the mass meeting for men only to be held Sunday afternoon in the tabernacle.

At the close of last night's meeting the general committee met and arranged for a men's get-together supper to be held next Wednesday evening at six o'clock in the Armory. This will be for all men of Salem and the surrounding communities, men of all faiths or of no faiths, creed or no creed. The plan is not to make money but to give the men of all beliefs a chance to meet on an equal footing and see and hear what the churches of the city are doing and hoping to do in Salem. There will be short talks by a number of prominent citizens and a brief talk by Ostrom.

**Big Irrigation Plant Near Pendleton Sold**  
Pendleton, Or., Feb. 4.—Through a deal closed here today the Inland Irrigation company owned and operated by W. J. Furnish, of Portland, E. P. Marshall, of Pendleton, and R. H. Irwin, of Stanfield, was sold to J. O. Storey and associates of Tacoma.

The consideration was not made public but is understood to have approximated \$500,000.

### SIDE LIGHTS ON THE LEGISLATURE

Mr. Barrows' bill, making it a crime for any one to drive an automobile or motor vehicle of any kind while in an intoxicated condition, was before the house yesterday when Representative Stewart interrupted the debate long enough to inquire what was the need of enacting legislation affecting intoxicated persons when there would be "no such animal" from and after January 1, 1916. Mr. Barrows replied that the state was not "dry" yet, and, even when it goes dry, "how could any one tell that the 'driver' was not the boss of bootlegging establishment?"

"I am so glad to find the Marion county delegation united on one bill that I am constrained to voteaye upon this measure," favorably remarked Representative Davey when he cast his vote for the Marion county gopher and mole bounty, yesterday afternoon. "Just because bicarbonate of carbon will kill them all off at comparatively little expense I note no," multiloaned Representative Lewis, of Multnomah, a few moments afterwards, in voting upon the same bill.

"The sergeant-at-arms will please provide a seat inside the railing for Hon. W. H. Hobson, former senator for Marion county," said Speaker Selling in extending the courtesies of the house to the sage of Stayton yesterday morning. Sergeant-at-Arms Tom Bruce seated around out in the gallery of the house and finally came in with Senator La Follet in tow and gave him a seat alongside Representative Allen. It wasn't Tom's fault if he misunderstood the name or was not acquainted with former Senator Hobson. The latter was shown to a seat in the midst of the Marion delegation later on, however, so what's the difference?

Representative Dana Allen, formerly the "Dan Cupid" in the county clerk's department for Marion county, has established a reputation as being strong for the Oregon "hen" because of his measures designed to legislate the Chinese hen out of competition with the home product. Yesterday afternoon it was noticed that he was somewhat listless concerning matters legislative and he seemed unusually preoccupied regarding things earthly when it was discovered that he seemed to be absorbed in the study of three Chinese "chickens" who occupied front seats in the house gallery. It would not be surprising, under the circumstances, if he asked the privilege of withdrawing his bills looking to the exclusion of Chinese eggs.

Representative "Jim" Stewart, the prohibition stalwart of Possil, was discussing the prohibition bill embroiled with a number of his fellow representatives, and the conversation drifted to the unusual length of the measure which has been drawn to put prohibition (so-called) into effect. "Why, Jim," said one of them, "the whole subject matter could have been covered in one page and it would have been just as effective." "Sure, I know it could," admitted Mr. Stewart. "Then what's the idea of such a long-winded, red-taped contraption anyway?" "Well," says "Jim," "you know I am a printer, don't you?"

### Iowa Senate Chaplain Is Arrested For Speeding

Phoenix, Ariz., Feb. 5.—The Rev. Bertrand R. Cox, chaplain of the state senate, was arrested today while on his way to "pray the senate open" for the day session.

Speeding toward the capitol in his automobile, with two senators in the tonneau, the minister was halted by a speed policeman and informed that he had exceeded 40 miles an hour.

In spite of the chaplain's assertion that the business of the state would be seriously impeded, the officer hauled him to the court of Police Judge Mayhew, who also turned a deaf ear to his plea, and fined him \$10.

The legislators who accompanied the minister threatened to introduce a bill in the senate to afford him relief.

The only clue to their identity is the description of the clothing taken. The robbery was committed between 1 and 2 o'clock last night as the officers made their rounds on these hours.

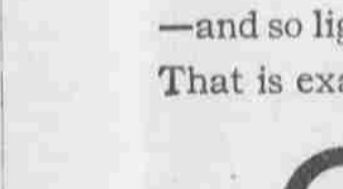

### HOUSE PASSES SEVERAL BILLS IN AFTERNOON

Strayer's Bill Providing for Registering Brands of Livestock Approved By Lower House.

Senator Strayer's bill, providing for a system of recording brands of livestock for the benefit and protection of the cattle raisers of Eastern Oregon was passed by the house yesterday afternoon, which was introduced at the request of the horse and cattle breeders association of Oregon, and designed to eliminate as far as possible the practice of horse and cattle "rustling" in that section of the state. The enforcement of the measure is placed under the jurisdiction of the state veterinarian, who receives a fee of \$1 for each mark or brand that he registers and records, and he is empowered to appoint deputy inspectors of brands in each of the counties where such an officer is needed and they are also paid on the inspection fee system.

The house also passed H. B. 278, by Fenwick, providing that incorporated cities and towns have control over cemeteries within their limits during the morning session, but upon second thought Representative Littlefield had the vote reconsidered and the bill referred to the committee for amendment so that the city of Portland will escape the responsibility and expense of management and upkeep of Lane cemetery which has filled up and there is no further source of revenue. H. B. 296, by the irrigation committee, which was defeated yesterday, was also reconsidered upon motion of Representative Hunt, and passed yesterday afternoon. This bill provides that all state land within irrigation districts be subject to assessment and taxation.

House bill 201, authorizing Lane county to purchase a site for a fair grounds for \$20,000 was passed, and several bills were indefinitely postponed upon recommendation of committees, as follows: H. B. 235, by Fenwick, prohibiting the hunting of wild birds with dogs; H. B. 237, by Collins, prohibiting the removal of numbers from boilers, etc.; and H. B. 394, by Horne (by request), making 10 hours a maximum day's work for druggists and drug clerks. House bills No. 16, by Gill, 234, by Clark, relating to Davey, providing for open season for game birds in Eastern Oregon, were indefinitely postponed upon the motion of the authors because they have been merged into a general bill for the amendment of the game laws to be introduced by the game committee.

### CHINESE ELECTROCUTED.

Ossining, N. Y., Feb. 5.—Lee Dock and Eng Hing, Chinese hatcher men, were electrocuted in Sing Sing prison here today. It was the first time New York state had ever put a Chinese to death. Both were members of the Hip Sing tong and were convicted of killing Lee Kay, the aged leader of the On Leong tong.
