Outside of the annual art exhibits made at the state fair, Salem people are rarely given an opportunity to view original displays, making these frequent events doubly appreciated. Beginning yesterday, a very notable array of water colors, by J. M. Crinks, of Portland, were placed on exhibit at the Frame Shop, and will remain in place for several days longer. Mr. Crinks is a former Portland artist and a prominent member of the Association of Oregon Artists. He brought his collection to Salem and will personally supervise the exhibit. Although the pupils of well-known eastern artists, his work is distinctly original. All the pictures are water colors, there being about fifty in all. They are quite liberal as to size and are executed in the semi-impressionist style. A pupil of Elkins, who was generally recognized as one of the foremost of contemporary painters of seascapes, Mr. Crinks' pictures are quite warm, light and poetic in quality.

As a painter of busy nights and fog, Mr. Crinks also stands prominent. He has several pictures of this character on display, which are very remarkable, treated as they are in an entirely original and interesting way. Few artists attempt pictures of this description, and few of those who do are successful in securing the wonderful results which Mr. Crinks has. Other very pleasing pictures are "Summer Afternoon," a middle western scene; several Canadian winter scenes; and "The Ventura Hills," and "Santa Clara Valley," showing southern California landscapes.

It is hoped that everyone in Salem, in any way interested in art, will take advantage of this opportunity of seeing these original displays. Mr. Crinks, of the Frame Shop, has been a considerable expense and effort to bring them to Salem, and has very graciously made the exhibit free to the public. Each exhibit in Portland, Chicago and all artistically inclined cities are seldom seen except under an admission price, art patrons always making an enthusiastic response to invitations and announcements.

Art interest in Salem has never been what it should be in a city of this class, and those who are interested in this form of culture should encourage any effort that is made to awaken an interest here.
