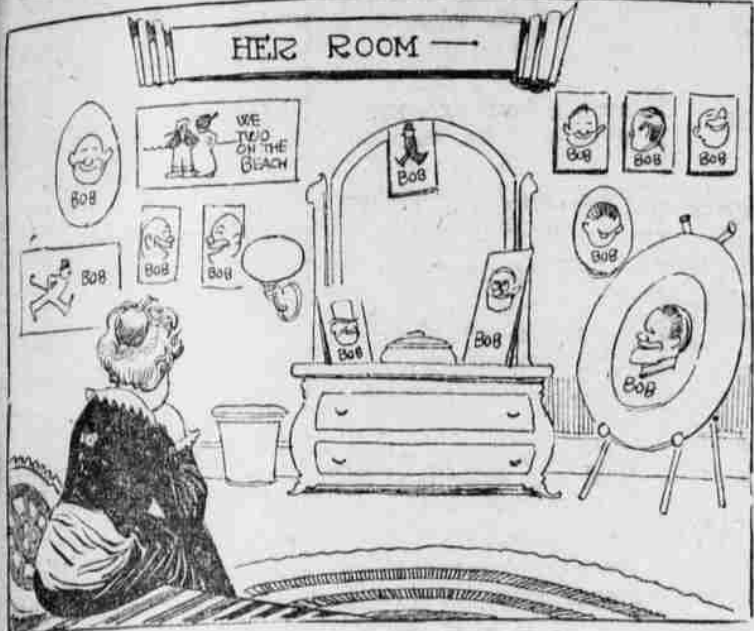
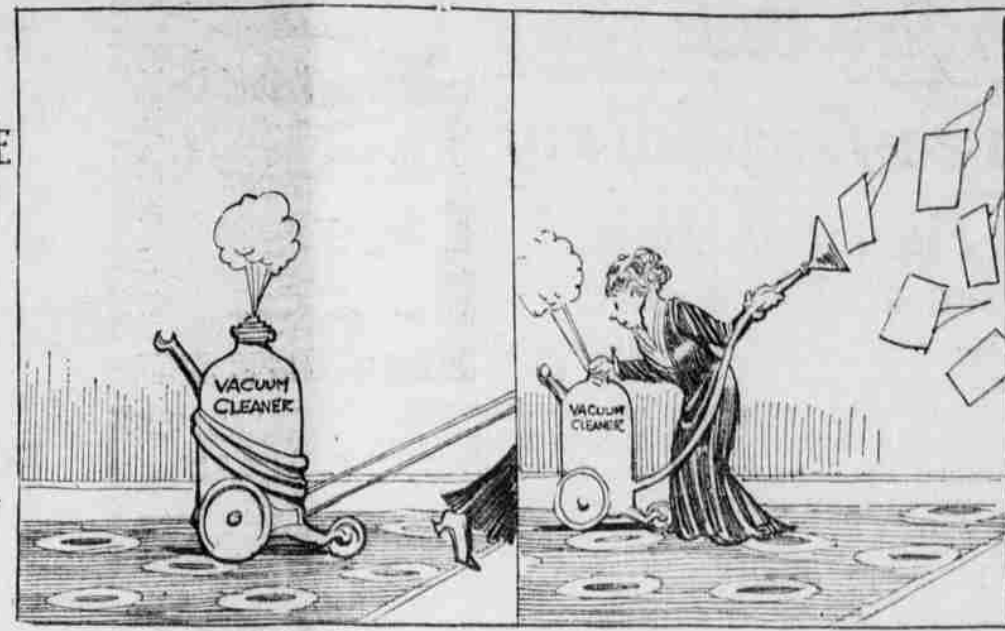

PHILLIPS GETS BIG CONTRACT.
 Commissioner Goulet and Road Master Oliver were here Monday and made arrangements with M. E. Phillips for furnishing the county 2000 yards or more gravel for the Pacific Highway from Aurora to the White school. Mr. Phillips pulls the gravel out of Pudding river by means of a bottomless scraper and a donkey engine, and places it in bunkers at 70 cents per yard for the first 2000 yards and 50 cents per yard thereafter. He will erect the bunkers at once and begin operations as soon as they are ready to receive the gravel. Supervisor H. J. Keil will begin the work of hauling as soon as the gravel is ready. He will secure all the teams he can get and finish the work as soon as possible. A trench 9 feet wide and 10 inches deep in the center of the roadway will be filled with gravel, which should make a gravelled roadway that will be a great improvement over the present road.—Aurora Observer.

WITNESS IS LOCKED UP.
 Los Angeles, Cal., March 16.—Jose Costello, a witness against Harry Chandler and others charged with violating the neutrality laws of the United States, was arrested today by Deputy United States marshals and locked in the county jail to be held as a witness. United States Attorney Gallaher feared that Costello would depart, and so secured this detention.

German Losses Heavy.
 London, March 16.—Field Marshal Sir John French reported this afternoon from the front that the German losses in the past three days' fighting in the Neuve Chapelle district have been between 17,000 and 18,000.
