Prominent Chinese Will Make Tour of U. S.

Seattle, Wash., March 17.—Secretary C. B. Vandell of the Seattle chamber of commerce will leave for San Francisco in a few days to make arrangements for a 11,000 mile tour of the United States by 50 prominent Chinese merchants, bankers and officials. The Chinese government, it is reported by Captain Robert Dollar in a cable to Vandell, has voted \$1,000,000 for this tour. Vandell is at the head of a committee of the associated chambers of commerce of the Pacific Coast to handle such tours. Other members of the committee are: Ex-Governor Pardee of California, James Shannon of Los Angeles, and Captain Robert Dollar of Seattle. President Thomas Burke of the United States today declared the coming tour will be the greatest possible instrument for promoting friendly trade relations. A similar tour by Japanese merchants in 1909 was followed by greater business associations especially on the Pacific coast. The tour is to start about May 1 from San Francisco and will end at Seattle July 10.

WIFE OF EX-GOVERNOR MOODY DIES SUDDENLY

Apparently In Best of Health When Life Is Ended Within Few Minutes

Mrs. Mary Moody, wife of Z. F. Moody, ex-governor of Oregon, died suddenly of congestive heart failure in this city last night. She apparently was in the best of health until stricken about 7 o'clock. She soon became unconscious and the end came in a few minutes.

Mrs. Moody attended a Bible study, conducted by Mrs. C. A. Parks, early in the afternoon and took a deep interest in the work. She walked home with several friends, chatting with them in her usually spirited manner. She greeted her husband shortly upon arriving home and retired to her room to prepare for the evening meal. The ex-governor and several women friends were with Mrs. Moody when she was stricken and although a physician was summoned at once he was unable to do anything for her. Her death apparently was accompanied by little suffering. Despite his advanced years Mr. Moody withstood the shock well and several hours later was able to give a sketch of Mrs. Moody's life. Mrs. Moody was born in Lebanon, Ind., April 18, 1836, her parents dying when she was young. She crossed the plains with a family named Henry in 1852 and settled at Union Point, near Brownsville, Lin county. She was married there in 1853. The young couple remained at Union Point until 1856, when they moved to Illinois. Returning to Oregon in 1862 Mr. and Mrs. Moody located in The Dalles, where they lived until 1882, when Mr. Moody was elected governor. They have since lived in Salem.

Besides her husband, she is survived by four children, Malcolm P. Moody, of The Dalles; Zona A. Moody, of Ashland; William B. Moody, of Shaniko, and Ralph E. Moody, of Portland. A daughter, Mrs. E. P. McCormack, died several years ago. Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Moody, of Portland, arrived last night, the remaining sons being expected tomorrow. Funeral announcements will not be made until all are here.

Skating Ordinance Goes Into Effect March 26

The anti-sidewalk skating ordinance will not go into effect until Friday, March 26, according to the statement of Mayor White today. The ordinance was signed by Mayor White yesterday and will be in effect in 10 days. The ordinance provides that all persons skated with roller skates shall be prohibited from skating in the district bounded on the north by the north line of Center street, on the east by the center line of High street, on the south by the south line of Ferry street, and on the west by the west line of Commercial street.

The penalty provided for the violation of this ordinance is a fine of from \$1 to \$5. The chief of police will enforce the ordinance rigidly, but for the first few days the officers will spend most of the time in warning the wheel-footed youngsters.

Salem Man Building Drier at Roseburg

A proposition to erect a public fruit drier in Roseburg was brought to light Monday night, when F. P. Patterson, a local contractor, asked permission of the city council to erect a building for such a purpose in the rear of the warehouse across the railroad tracks from the depot. Mr. Patterson will have a half interest in the proposition, the other half being the share of Mr. McDaniel, of Salem, who is owner of a drier there and is taking an active interest in the drier here. Mr. McDaniel will probably assume management of the local plant, at least until it is well established.—Roseburg Review.
