

EDDY TELLS HOW TO HANDLE WOODEN CLUBS

Professional Golf Player At Country Club Gives First Lesson On Driver

The following is a lesson in the use of the wooden club by G. H. Eddy, the professional golf player in charge of the Salem Country Club links:

The first thing a beginner has to learn is how to hold the club. There are two ways. One is the Vardon grip, or lock grip, in which the left thumb is placed in the palm of the right hand and the little finger of the right hand over the forefinger of the left hand. This grip prevents one from grasping the club too much in the palm of the hands as it not only gets the hands closer together as if it were one hand but it allows a freer swing.

The other grip is with the left thumb down around the shaft and as a result the grip is too much from the palm of the hand and tending to make the swing too rigid. In gripping with the palm of the hands it is natural for one to set the muscles of the arms rigidly, which is fatal to the wooden club. In playing all wooden clubs the swing must come from the wrist, with iron clubs it is more from the forearm, which shall be taken up later.

The question of stance is a most important point for the beginner and should be considered at the beginning. The two forms of the stance are the "square stance" and the "open stance". In the former the toes, when the stance has been taken up after the address, are nearly in a straight line with each other, parallel to the intended line of flight of the ball. The left may be just an inch or so behind. With the open stance the left foot is sometimes as much as ten or twelve inches or even more. Thus the whole attitude of the player toward the ball and stroke are different. I strongly advise the square stance as one has a better control over the ball and will also get a straighter drive.

The danger of the open stance is the tendency which undoubtedly exists with most players to put the body into the stroke too soon. Unconsciously the strength of the body seems to enter into the stroke almost as soon as the club begins to descend. When a player is off his game the body is constantly getting there before the club and that is the cause of so many top-flopped balls.

Another important point regarding the stance is not to stand too close to the ball. It is clear that the closer the player stands to the ball the more cramped and restricted will be his movements. Their swing will have a strong tendency to be both short and upright and the long clean drive is almost impossible. To secure distance the ball must be driven by a free, round swing with the weight of the body well back on the heels and the knees relaxed. Care should be taken not to stoop as there is danger in overreaching the ball and driving it with the heel of the club which will result in a badly sliced ball and often a broken club and it is cheaper to get

Vancouver Winner Of Third Straight Game

Vancouver, B. C., March 27.—Outplaying the Ottawa team in every department of the game, Vancouver won the third straight game of the world's championship series with the eastern champions at the Arena rink last night, thereby capturing the world's premier hockey honors. Vancouver's win was the most decisive of the series, the Pacific coast champions rumping home by a score 12 to 3.

Vancouver clearly and cleanly fulfilled every claim to superiority over the entrants in the match which closed the series last night. If supporters of the Ottawa club conceded the Vancouver a change before the commencement of the match their hopes were rapidly dispelled when the great scoring machine of the Vancouver team got going in the second and third periods.

Robbers Blow Five Safes and Secure Good Haul

Chicago, March 27.—One of the most daring robberies in years, resulting in eight safe blowers escaping with from \$1,000 to \$10,000 in cash, occurred here early today.

The eight robbers, all masked, "jimmied" their way into the office of the Babson Brothers mail order house. They overpowered the night watchman and beat him into insensibility. They then dynamited five safes, one on each of the five floors of the building, and escaped. The night watchman was found later when other persons entered the office. He is said to be in a critical condition.

DENVER SURVIVORS IN PORT.

New York, March 27.—Sixteen survivors of the steamship Denver, which sank in mid-ocean early this week, reached quarantine today aboard the liner Megantic. They included the captain, mate and 14 sailors from the ill-fated ship. Others aboard the Denver were taken off by the steamer Manhattan.

PREPARING TO DEPORT CONVICTS AND INSANE

Immigration Inspector R. P. Bonham Finds Several Eligibles In Asylum

Inspector Raphael P. Bonham, of the U. S. immigration service, is conducting examinations of alien patients at the insane asylum and convicts at the penitentiary for deportation purposes and expects to finish his work today or early next week. He has about nine patients and convicts which he will recommend for deportation to various parts of Europe to his department and he believes that an Italian, who will probably be received at the insane asylum today or tomorrow, is eligible for deportation to Italy.

The war situation in Europe has greatly retarded the work of deportation of alien insane and criminals to those countries which are at war and about the only countries to which they can be shipped at the present time are the British isles, France and Italy. No deportations whatever are attempted to Germany or Austria and there is some trouble being experienced at present in getting deported aliens to the Scandinavian countries on account of the mines in the North Sea.

Two alien convicts were shipped from the penitentiary last week, one for England and another for Mexico, and there are two cases in the asylum who had been committed to asylums in their native European countries before coming to the United States.

Mr. Bonham was born and raised in Marion county, the only son of the late Judge R. P. Bonham. Mrs. Bonham is also a native of Marion county, the daughter of Judge W. H. Holmes.

NOTED PEACE LECTURER WILL SPEAK IN SALEM

"Europe's Carnival of Blood and Iron, and what the United States can do to bring about universal peace on a basis of international conciliation and arbitration," is the theme of the address to be delivered Sunday evening at Unity Church by Mr. Wm. H. Galvani, secretary of the Oregon Peace Society. Mr. Galvani is one of the most eloquent and best known public speakers in the state. He was formerly the engineer of the Oregon Electric Railway, and is now with the Pacific Power & Light Company. He represents Oregon on the National Committee for the Third Hague Peace Conference. He has just completed what is recognized as the most important petition to the President to renew his efforts in behalf of the restoration of peace among the twelve European nations that are involved in war. This petition was signed by the governor, state officials, president of the senate, speaker of the house, supreme justices, presidents of banks, railroads and public service corporations, manufacturing and mercantile houses, editors of newspapers and other very prominent citizens of Oregon. His address at the Unitarian church will be delivered under the auspices of the Social Service organization of that body, and there will be no charge for admission, and no funds raised for any purpose connected with the European war or the organization which he represents. It is hoped that every peace loving man and woman in Salem will turn out to hear Mr. Galvani. The speaker does not seek to place the blame for the war upon any nation, and is not a partisan for or against any of the great European powers.

New York, March 27.—California is to be invaded by a number of eastern tennis stars next summer. It is proposed to send a picked team of the best eastern players and have them participate in a number of tournaments in different cities en route. According to the statement made recently, the team of eastern players will leave for California in July. It will be composed of men selected from among R. Norris Williams 24, the national champion; Theodore Roosevelt Pell, Gustave P. Teneard, Irving C. Wright, Watson M. Washburn, George M.

British Steamer Pounds To Pieces Off Morocco

Cadiz, Spain, March 27.—With sixty members of her crew still on board, the British steamer Trostburg is pounding to pieces today near Cape Spartel, on the coast of Morocco, according to dispatches received here. The advices indicated that the vessel was about to break in two and that the lives of those on board were in imminent danger.

Three British destroyers and the French cruiser Friant are standing by. The Friant's boats took off 13 members of the crew. High seas prevented further efforts at rescue.

PITTSBURG PIRATES HAVE THREE RECRUITS FROM WHOM GREAT THINGS ARE EXPECTED



Joe J. Murphy, Walter Gerber and Bill Hinchman are three recruits that are expected to strengthen the Pittsburgh Pirates this year. Murphy is a catcher and comes from the champion Sioux City team of the Western league. He batted .323 last year and made only nine errors in 70 games. Gerber will be tried at short field in place of Wagner, who is likely to be moved to first base. Gerber was with Columbus in the American association last year. He batted .259 and was at the top of the shortstops in fielding, his average being .936. Bill Hinchman, his roommate and former manager, plays in the outfield. He led his association in hitting last season, having a fat average of .366.
