SOUTHERN COMPANY MUST PAY TAXES DECLARES COURT

Federal Litigation to Forfeit Title Does Not Effect Taxes Upon Land

In a per curiam opinion the supreme court this morning affirmed the decree of Judge Cole, of the circuit court for Coos county in the case of the Southern Oregon company, plaintiff and appellant, vs. W. W. Sage, sheriff and tax collector, holding that the Southern Oregon company is required to pay taxes upon lands claimed by that company under legislative grant of 1870, for military road purposes, notwithstanding the pendency of a suit in the federal court to annul the company's title to such lands. The taxes for which the company is delinquent are for the years 1910-11-12 and 13 and amount to \$140,000, which amount the company has placed in escrow with the court pending settlement of the federal suit.

Other opinions rendered by the supreme court this morning follow: I. M. Francis vs. W. A. Rohart, appellant, appealed from Lane county, action to recover possession of stock, opinion by Justice Burnett. Circuit Judge Cole's judgment for plaintiff reversed.

Anders Highland et al vs. Ole Tollefson, appellant, appealed from Multnomah county, involving an order approving an administrator's account, opinion by Chief Justice Moore. Judgment of Circuit Judge Cole in favor of the plaintiff modified.

Rudolph Markwart et al vs. D. M. Kliever, appellants, appealed from Multnomah county, suit to reform a deed, opinion by Justice Eakin. Circuit Judge McGinn affirmed.

A. C. Barclay, appellant, vs. Oregon Washington Railroad & Navigation company, appealed from Multnomah county, action for damages for personal injuries, opinion Justice Benson, judgment of Circuit Judge McGinn for defendant affirmed.

T. B. Potter Realty company vs. J. M. Derby, appellant, appealed from Marion county, action to recover installment claims due on a contract for the purchase of real estate, opinion by McBride, Circuit Judge Kelly's judgment for plaintiff reversed.

Herold Nelson, appellant, vs. Portland Gas & Coke company, appealed from Multnomah county, action to recover damages for personal injuries, opinion by Justice Eakin. Circuit Judge Davis' judgment for defendant affirmed.

Petitions for rehearing were denied in Jennings & Sons vs. Weinberger. Petition for rehearing was granted in Rohart vs. Parker.

Motion to dismiss appeal was denied in Birkmeier vs. Town of Milwaukee with leave to renew it at final hearing. Appeal was dismissed in Curry vs. Johnson.

SUICIDE OF CLERK.

San Francisco, April 13.—When a customer stepped into a cigar store here today, Peter Scannanelli, aged 45, the clerk refused to accept his money, and asked that he "have a cigar on him."

As the surprised customer helped himself, Scannanelli suddenly reached behind the counter, whipped out a revolver and attempted suicide. He fired a bullet into his brain. He was removed to Central Emergency hospital in a dying condition.

Claim Big Growers Driving Out Lesser

(Continued from Page One.)

during a discussion of the situation last evening. "As fast as the small grower reduces his acreage the more extensive growers and dealer-growers increase their acreage until it would be a matter of a very few years until the big growers would secure a monopoly upon the production; once gained it would not be difficult for them to maintain it indefinitely."

"It is quite apparent to the careful observer that whenever the hop market becomes sluggish with a downward tendency that the big growers and the grower-dealers are almost invariably upon the 'board' side of the market and their views upon the situation are of the most gloomy and discouraging character. I am satisfied that the present unsettled condition of the hop market is due to manipulation; that all of this 'sears' about the war going to ruin the brewing industry and, consequently, the hop industry; that the Eastern and European brewers are not wanting any more hops on account of the uncertainty of the prohibition question in Europe, is all hush."

"To be sure there has been some agitation of the prohibition question in some of the leading nations recently and it has been taken advantage of and utilized by the interests who are trying to monopolize the growing end of the industry as a means to an end. As a matter of fact all of the anti-liquor agitation that is being made in England and France and other countries of Europe, engaged in the war, has been for the curtailment of the indulgence in strong liquors and there has been no fight waged against beer and the lighter wines."

"The present stagnant condition of the hop market is altogether uncalled for, if the rule of supply and demand is to be applied to the hop and brewing industries. At least this is so insofar as the Oregon crop is concerned. The general world market should not affect the Oregon grower who puts up a first class merchantable article and it would not if the growers could be made to understand the situation. It is an undisputed fact, which is borne out by chemical analyses made by the experimental station of the O. A. C. and substantiated by the bureau of chemistry of the U. S. department of agriculture, that a superior quality of hops is produced in the Willamette valley which is in a class by itself and not equal or duplicated for strength and flavor any place else in the United States; that there is a fixed demand for the Oregon product in England and among the leading brewer of the East and they are determined to have Oregon hops, regardless of the market price."

"The hop growers' association is the only salvation for the Oregon hop grower and it is gaining in strength every day. We are making splendid progress in signing up the growers and are receiving most encouraging reports of progress from the California growers who will file their articles of incorporation on May 1, with between 60 and 70 per cent of the growers tied up in the association. There are so many of the Oregon growers, who have not yet taken an active interest in the organization movement, who are signing up for stock and membership voluntarily and practically all of them who have signified a willingness before coming in as fast as the field agents seek them out and present the papers."

"We are already recognized as a big factor in the hop industry and market movement daily. We are more certain now than ever that the association will be a pronounced success and just as soon as our agents have finished up the work of signing up the stock subscriptions, which is being done at the rate of several thousand dollars every day, we will be ready for business and we intend to go into it actively and aggressively from the start."

"When such men as Phil Matschen, Sr., proprietor of the Imperial hotel, of Portland, and J. S. Cooper, of Independence, his partner in the hop growing business, put in this 5000 bales of hops and give their checks for \$2,000 in stock and such well-known and substantial growers as William Bagley, of Hillsboro, 500 bales; A. M. Bolter, of Brooks, 500 bales; W. M. Mahoney, of Gervais, between 700 and 800 bales, come into the organization and put up their money without hesitation, it speaks volumes for the bona fides of the organization and the sound business basis upon which it is founded and it is to be hoped that every grower in the state, large and small, will join the association and make it doubly strong and an overpowering factor in the future hop markets of the world."
