TWO SCHOOLS OF SALEM ARE NAMED AFTER PRESIDENTS

East School Is Named "Washington" and New Heights School "McKinley"

Hereafter the old East school building, which has been so designated and distinguished ever since "Heck was a pup," will be known as the "Washington school" and the new grade school to be constructed upon Salem Heights will be known as the McKinley school. These two things were definitely decided upon by the board of school directors at last night's regular meeting and the question of whether the other grade schools which now bear locality names, such as Yew Park, Englewood, Richmond and Highland, will be provided with names in honor of distinguished presidents, statesmen or men of letters, was deferred to another meeting. In the meantime it was the expressed hope of the board that the public would offer some suggestions and express a wish in the matter as to what names the school buildings in their respective neighborhoods should bear.

It took three "straw" votes to enable the board to decide upon a suitable and satisfactory name for the new grade building for South Salem, "McKinley" having been unanimously adopted as a result of the third ballot, and then arose a general discussion as to whether or not the board should supply a suitable name for all the unnamed schools, including the high school. Chairman Miles expressed strong preference for the name of Emerson for the high school and Jefferson for the Yew Park, or some other school. Director Buren wanted to go ahead and wish the name of Jefferson upon the Park school and "get it off our chests," as he expressed it.

Directors White, Lee and Barnes, however, preferred to have an expression of preference from the people before deciding upon any name for the schools and the matter was allowed to rest for the time being.

The board preferred to leave the question to a "straw" vote of the people to either offer their suggestions through the medium of the newspapers or to be decided by the parent-teachers' associations, preferably the latter.

Millions of Eggs Flood Storage Plants

New York, April 13.—Spring is here and the hens are laying, but cold storage firms are sad; for there's a plenty of eggs for which we've been praying, yet it looks like they've all become bad.

This is the "lay" of spring of the cold storage houses, who say that they lack cold storage room for millions of dozens of eggs which are flooding the market with the opening of the storage season. The flood of henfruit from Texas has already begun.

The outlook for supplies of "nearby" eggs is also unusually bright—for those who eat eggs for prices are believed due for a sharp drop. In fact, prices are already on the toboggan. The trouble with the storage situation, according to refrigeration houses, is that they are full of American and Argentine beef held to be shipped to Europe, and have not the usual room for spring egg storage.

One bright cloud on the egg horizon is that Argentine and other South American countries, which usually buy their eggs in Europe, are now buying their supplies in this market. This may help out the threatened egg oversupply. Canada is also said to be in the egg market here to an unusually large extent. The Canadian hens have not gone on a strike, according to market reports, but the supply there has been curtailed by English buyers for the allies, and Canada is now turning to Uncle Sam's hen farms for her domestic supplies.

Some retailers here predict that eggs will hit the rock bottom price of 25 cents a dozen here this spring, after selling up to 35 and 45 during the last few months. The bonafide specialists of Mrs. American Hen are already evident in cafes and restaurants, where egg menus are being featured—with profit both to the patrons and the proprietors.

Roseburg May Vote On Railroad Bonds

Roseburg, Or., April 13.—By unanimous vote the city council last night authorized the calling of a special election to ballot on the proposition of floating municipal bonds in the sum of \$500,000 with which to help Kendall Bros. construct a standard gauge railroad from Roseburg to the line of the Cascade forest reserve on the North Umpqua river. The election will be held on June 4.

The bonds are to be voted contingent on the carrying out of Kendall Bros. contract to the effect that they will construct the railroad and erect a sawmill in this city. The railroad and sawmill will represent an expenditure of approximately \$1,250,000.

By a vote of five to three the council refused to adopt a resolution offered by Councilman Hamilton resending bonds in the sum of \$500,000 which were voted some time ago to assist in the construction of a railroad from Roseburg to Coos Bay. The council chamber was crowded during the proceedings and several spirited speeches enlivened the occasion.

GERMANY WITHHOLDS PAYMENT.

Sofia, April 13.—Germany has defaulted the installment of the Bulgarian loan due April 1, it was stated here today. The general belief is that Germany is withholding payment because of Bulgaria's plans to enter the war on the side of the allies.
