### TEMPORARY BUILDING COSTLY TO PUBLIC

Summary of Road Work For April Shows Graveling Cost Nearly \$2 Yard

County Clerk Gehlar has just completed making a summary of the road work done in Marion county for the month of April. In this summary the cost of each class of work, which is kept separate by the new system of accounting, is shown, and that which is permanent and which temporary indicated. It is shown that 5436 yards of gravel were hauled and that the cost, counting everything, amounted to \$9,773.40, which brings the cost of each yard nearly up to \$2. In all, the money spent went to 747 people in amounts ranging from 10 cents to \$95. The following are the items:

Her condition had not been considered serious, however, death coming suddenly. Miss Enid Leeper, of O. A. C. was secured to take her place. Miss Rupert was a graduate of the Gem City Town Business college and had taught in both the grade and high schools of the east for a number of years. The family removed here from Cherokee, Iowa.

Besides her parents, Miss Rupert leaves a brother, a student at Willamette university, a sister, Miss Mable Rupert who teacher near Stayton, and several brothers who reside in the east. No funeral arrangements will be made until the arrival of the latter.

BONDS FAILED TO CARRY. San Francisco, April 21.—Complete count of the vote cast on the proposition of purchasing the Spring Valley water system showed today that the necessary two thirds majority was not registered, and the \$34,500,000 bond issue failed to carry.

The total vote was 73,643, which was divided 39,75 in favor of the purchase and 33,518 against it.

### EXCAVATION WORK FOR NEW BUILDING IS STARTED TODAY

Elegant Rodgers-McNary Apartment Building To Be Credit To the City

The first step toward actual construction work upon the proposed new apartment building, to be erected at the corner of Court and Cottage streets by George F. Rodgers and Charles L. McNary, was taken this morning when the work of excavation was begun by the firm of J. H. Sharp & company, of this city, who has taken the contract. As soon as excavation is finished for the basement the work of building will be begun and rushed through to the earliest completion so as to be ready for occupancy by early fall.

The basement is to be excavated to a depth of six feet. The building will cover two sides of the corner, 83 feet on Court street and 100 feet on Cottage, with the main entrance at the corner. The building will be a three-story structure of two and three-room apartments, designed after the latest style of construction and thoroughly modern in its appointment throughout. The contract for the building has not been let as yet but the cost is estimated at between \$40,000 and \$50,000.

### GOVERNOR CANNOT PAY STORAGE ON STOCK OF "BOOZE"

Storage Man Must Get His Pay For Keeping Seized Goods Elsewhere

Governor Withycombe is in receipt of a bill for the storage of 8,190 pounds of "booze," which was seized as a result of former Governor West's military raid upon the Copperfield saloons a little over a year ago, which, at the rate of \$1 per 100 pounds per month amounts to \$122.85 and he is at a loss what to do with it. Not having any authority or funds available for the payment of storage upon "booze" Governor Withycombe has "passed the mustard" up to Attorney General Brown for solution and disposal (of the problem, not the booze) upon the latter's return from Washington, D. C.

Some time ago a bill was sent in to Governor Withycombe for a couple of hundred dollars, for services and expenses of one of ex-Governor West's marshalls, who served during the Copperfield raid, and the governor then thought he had heard the last of the episode. He was nonplussed when he received the bill for "booze" storage and says that, in his estimation, the only way that the storage man may receive his pay is to either sell the booze at public auction, have the saloonman and former owner bail it out or go to former Governor West for his money. It is understood that Attorney General Brown, on his way to Washington, stopped off in Baker and when the matter was called to his attention, informed the storage man that the state was not authorized to pay any bills of this character and that it is probably the reason it was forwarded to Governor Withycombe.

PEACE IS IN SIGHT. (Chicago, April 21.—Peace was in sight today in the carpenters' strike here. The contractors agreed to meet representatives of the union in a series of discussions on the wage demands made by the men, without the aid of the state board of arbitration.

The carpenters demanded an increase of 5 cents an hour. A compromise offer of a 2 1/2-cent an hour raise was rejected and then withdrawn by the contractors. More than 18,000 carpenters are out, and many more thousands of other workers are indirectly affected.
