### Auto Racing Has Its Own Peculiar Thrills

Did you ever ride around a mile track in a racing car with one of the most famous auto drivers in the northwest who had instructions to scare you a bit? No. Well, it's quite a sensation. Jim Parsons, who drives his Parsons Special in the races tomorrow, took a journal representative as a passenger while he was trying out the fairgrounds track yesterday afternoon, and as there is only one Jim Parsons and not a great many racing cars, compared with other autos and Fords, a few simple rules are laid down whereby any citizen might obtain the same sensations.
