CITY HALL NEWS

The men were taken back to McMinnville this afternoon to stand trial in that city.

Court House News

The plaintiff states that his wife expressed the wish that her maiden name of Daisy Jones be restored and he said he had no objection to her dropping the Damon. Attorneys Smith & Shields are representing the plaintiff.

In department No. 2 of the circuit court today Judge Galloway heard an argument on a demurrer in the case of F. W. Borneo and Mrs. W. A. Borneo, his wife, against the Falls City Lumber company, a suit for damages on an alleged false misrepresentation. Judge Galloway took the matter under advisement.

Arguments on a demurrer were heard in department No. 2 of the circuit court this afternoon in the case of the Salem Bank of Commerce against the Horseshoe Lake Farming & Development company and others. W. C. Winslow appeared for the plaintiff and Carson and Brown for the defendant. The judge took the matter under advisement.

The county court today ordered a survey of the road petitioned for by G. E. Berringer and others in districts No. 33 1-2 and No. 34. The application of W. B. Brown and others for a county road in District No. 7 was denied when it was found that a remonstrance against the proposed road contained more names of residents of the district than did the petition. The remonstrances recited that the road was not of sufficient public utility, a private way was already provided, it would be too expensive and would damage Joe Schlechter, Jr., and Joseph Schlechter, Sr. The indemnity claim of Burdick and Smith for a tubercular cow ordered killed was set for a hearing June 4. The claim report of the county treasurer for the six months ending April 1 was approved.
