CONGRESS OF MOTHERS ASKS PRESIDENT TO END EUROPEAN WAR

Delegates Subscribe \$500 To Establish Endowment Fund For Association

Portland, Or., May 13.—At the earliest possible moment that he deems wise, President Wilson has been asked to use the influence of the United States to end the European war. The request came from the executive board of the National Congress of Mothers, it was announced by Mrs. Frederick C. Schoff, president of the national organization, who made her annual report to the national congress convened at the library in Portland, this morning.

"The board took this course in the belief that it is the function of our government to do this," she said, "that it is the desire of the government to do it, and that the president has inside information and will know when mediation is feasible."

This expression of confidence in President Wilson, as well as every expression for peace, was greeted with enthusiasm. "Mothers and children are the real sufferers in war," said Mrs. Schoff, "and there is a rapidly growing sentiment that the people who give their lives, the mothers and children who are left broken hearted and destitute, should have some voice in deciding whether war is necessary."

Mrs. Schoff linked the child welfare movement and the peace movement, and urged strongly against the movement which she said found expression in bills before several state legislatures, to make military training compulsory in the schools for boys aged more than ten.

"The lessons of the war that should sink into the hearts of fathers and mothers and teachers," she said, "are the need for teaching children the golden rule as applied to life, and to resist persistently every effort to bring militarism into the United States."

Military training for boys she said should be resisted with all the power of organized motherhood as an "unjustified effort to graft on our country a system which has been one of the contributing causes of the world war."

Court House News

Austin Nichols & Co., of New York, today filed a suit in the circuit court against E. W. Powers and G. B. Powers, doing business as E. W. Powers & Son.

It is alleged in the complaint that April 1, 1914, Nathan Abramowitz, who after being assigned the contract to the plaintiffs, entered into a contract with the defendants whereby they were to furnish certain dried fruits to the plaintiffs. The goods contracted for were 375 25-pound cases of 30-40 Italian prunes at 7 7-8 cents per pound; 750 25-pound cases of 40-50 Italian prunes at 7 7-8 cents per pound; 375 25-pound cases of 50-60 Italian prunes at 6 5-8 cents per pound. It is alleged that the fruits were to be delivered by October 10, 1914, but the plaintiff claims that they were not received on that date, and the firm sustained a loss of \$500 in profits on this sum, together with the costs of the action.

Judge Galloway today granted a decree of divorce to Hazel Charleston Reid from Sydney A. Reid in department No. 2 of the circuit court. The couple were married August 21, 1913, and Mrs. Reid testified that her husband deserted her December 28 of the same year. Her maiden name of Hazel Charleston Cook was restored to her.

A suit was brought in the circuit court of this county yesterday afternoon by C. A. Wallace and E. J. Wallace against J. H. O. Mueller and Maggie May Mueller and the City of Salem, to foreclose a mortgage for \$2000 on some real estate in this city belonging to the first named defendants and in which the city has an interest through a lien. The plaintiffs seek to recover in addition the sum of \$150 for attorney's fees. Attorneys Smith & Shields are appearing for the plaintiffs.

The Portland Railway, Light & Power company yesterday brought suit against L. B. N. Pierce in the circuit court to collect the sum of \$49.92 alleged due for gas and electrical merchandise sold and delivered for gas and electric current. It is alleged further that the goods were sold November 21, 1912, and December 7, 1914, and in all amounted to \$116.24, but of this sum \$46.62 has been paid, leaving the balance of \$69.62 due. The plaintiff seeks a judgment in this sum and the costs of the action. Attorneys Smith & Shields represent the plaintiffs.

British Warship Sunk With Loss Of 500

gunboats and a large transport. The Turkish loss of life as result of the destruction of these vessels was not stated.

A special shore battery launched the torpedo which struck the Goliath, the reports received by the admiralty stated.

Churchill first announced that the enemy had sunk the Goliath, and that 700 officers and 100 men had been saved. The announcement today was the first official word that the allied fleet has again been actively engaged inside the Dardanelles. In previous operations there the British battleships Ocean and Irresistible were sunk on March 18. The French warship Bouvet was also destroyed inside the straits. The French marine office stated that the Bouvet was sunk by a mine, but Constanti-

nople declared the vessel was torpedoed. Churchill said the Goliath was sunk last night while protecting the flank of the French landing forces on the Asiatic side of the Dardanelles from inside the strait. Later dispatches received reported that a flotilla of destroyers attacked the Goliath.

The Goliath was a vessel of 12,000 tons and was laid down in 1897, and completed in 1900 at a cost of \$3,354,054. Her normal complement was 700 men. The Goliath's armament consisted of four 12-inch and 12 six-inch guns and four torpedo tubes. She was considered a formidable vessel, although one of the older warships of the British navy.

Italian Steamers Warned.

New York, May 13.—An ominous intimation of the intention of Italy to plunge into the European war was given today when New York representatives of the five largest Italian steamship lines admitted that they had received instructions to refuse passage to men, women and children of German, Austrian or Turkish nationality or naturalized Americans of the same birth.

The representatives would not discuss the details of their instructions, but it was believed that these were issued by the home offices of the companies under direction of the Italian government.

Arranging for Hospitals.

Florence, Italy, May 13.—Arrangements were completed today to turn Florence into a great hospital center in case Italy enters the war.

Government officials have completed a house to house canvass of the town determining just what hotels and homes will be placed at the disposal of the nation for use as hospitals. Women will serve as nurses and replace the men now employed on the tramways, as messengers and in other occupations. Many have been enrolled for service.

Russians Claim Successes.

Petrograd, May 13.—Reinforcements are being rushed today to the support of the Russians east of the San river. It was semi-officially stated that though the Russians continue to retreat at certain points in this region, the main force of the Austro-German offensive is nearly spent. The idea that Presnyal has again fallen into the hands of the Austrians is scouted by military authorities.

No fear was expressed here today of the ultimate defeat of the German forces in Galicia. A semi-official statement declared:

"Our lines are being rearranged and reinforced. We are ready to take revenge upon the enemy, whose losses already total 100,000."

The war office today minimized the importance of the Austro-German offensive in the Ussuk region. While the Russians withdrew to the northwest of Ussuk they have successfully resisted every effort of the enemy to advance further.

The main objective of the Austro-German armies—to force the retirement of the Russians from the Carpathians, has not been accomplished. The war office emphasized the continued success of the Russians on their left wing, north of Bukovina. Along this front decided advances have been made and Zaleskyj has been re-taken. Gernovits, 26 miles northwest of Gernovits, Over 3000 prisoners have been taken in this region and the Austrians are declared to have been completely cleared from the left bank of the Dniester.

Germany Angers Chile.

Santiago, Chile, May 13.—Although the greatest threat is observed, it was learned today that the government is incensed over the note received regard-

ing the sinking of the cruiser Dresden off Juan Fernandez islands by the British on March 14.

Germany protested against Chile's acceptance of England's apology for having attacked the Dresden in Chilean waters. The note is said to have been couched in such terms that Chile forwarded a sharp communication to Berlin in reply. Officials refused to comment on a report that the severing of diplomatic relations had been threatened.

Turks Curse War.

(By Henry Wood, United Press Staff Correspondent.)

Constantinople, May 11.—[By telegraph to Athens and cable via Lausanne May 13.—The arrival of 15,000 Turkish wounded from the Gallipoli peninsula this morning converted Constantinople into a city of tears. Crowds of women—paraded the streets, and war and those responsible for Turkey's participation in the present conflict. Sultan Mohammed, according to a report reaching the American press, has threatened to abdicate.

The Young Turks have given the city authorities carte blanche to prevent any risings in the city against the present government by Mussulmans opposed to Kaiser's domination. It is presently reported that the authorities have promised the legal Mussulmans permission to church themselves being the property and institutions Christians in event of a big Turk victory.

Despite the obvious precarious situation, the Young Turks are apparently determined to continue the resistance to the end, and fresh reinforcements are being rushed to the Dardanelles.

Brilliant Success Says Paris.

Paris, May 13.—"Brilliant success" are claimed today for the war effort of the great battle which is now being fought from Artois to the sea.

In the woods east of Arras, the French have captured additional trenches. The French have made important progress toward Lens, the main objective.

Carency is now wholly occupied by the French, it was officially announced this afternoon.

The German positions were untenable by heavy fire from the French guns and the enemy evacuated the entire town after having suffered heavy losses.

Germany Report Victory.

Berlin, May 13.—The German official report today said:

"In the Eastern theater—the battle at Shavil, in Courland, still is going on without any result having been reached. On the Rens, a Russian advance which made an attempt to cross the river was annihilated."

"In the southeastern area of the war, our pursuit behind the Vistula and the Vistula river is in full swing and further progress has been inflicted upon the enemy along this entire front. For example, a battalion of the Russian 10th regiment alone took 14 officers, 1000 men, a colonel, and 4500 men, including a machine gun company, horses and one baggage column."

"Forces of the Russian 10th army crossed the river San between Sank and Tylow. Further in the morning they have reached the region of Rosowomilno."

"Troops fighting in the Carpathians on both sides of the Tatra mountains on the eastern out of his position."
