Cedar Falls Doomed By Rattlesnake Lake

Seattle, Wash., May 13.—Cedar Falls, of which some half stood completely submerged today by the waters rising in Rattlesnake lake, is doomed to utter destruction.

This is the prediction of C. W. Lee, superintendent of construction at Seattle's Mayor's office, who is in charge of the situation at the falls city.

The rush of water through the surrounding hills from the Cedar river basin cannot be checked for at least two weeks, he declared. At the present rate of flow, Cedar Falls will be completely inundated in 12 days.

Rattlesnake lake, the cause of the trouble is a pond that is waterless in the winter months, being brought into existence each year by seasonal rains. John D. Gets Injunction Against Collection of Tax

Cleveland, Ohio, May 13.—John D. Rockefeller today won his injunction to restrain the authorities of Cuyahoga county from collecting taxes on \$111,000,000 in tangible property owned by the oil king in Cleveland.

Federal Judge Clark rendered the decision. His statement upholding Rockefeller's contentions as to why he should not be taxed on this property covered 19 closely typewritten pages.

The county's only hope now of collecting the taxes on Rockefeller's stock, bonds and money rests on an appeal. The case will be carried to the supreme court of the United States.

Rockefeller contends that he is not a resident of Cleveland. He claims Tarrytown, N. Y., as his home. The county sought to collect the taxes because of an extended period during which Rockefeller remained in Cleveland two years ago, claiming that he had established legal residence there.

RURAL CREDITS IS STATE GRANGE ISSUE

Committee Urges Session to
Call on Congress for Act
to Reduce Interest on
Long Time Loans

Tillamook, Or., May 13.—Demands for a rural credit or Federal long-time loan law were made in a committee report to the state grange in session here today. After an hour of discussion, the grange decided to take no action on the report until the committee in charge of the Bathrick bill has announced its findings.

The committee also urged the grange to declare that it would support no candidate for the United States Senate who would not promise to work and vote for a rural credit law.

Increase in the limit placed on Postal Savings accounts to \$5000 with the privilege of diverting these funds to the farmers at a low rate of interest was favored by the committee in a resolution which was adopted.

A resolution also was adopted by the grange declaring against tax exemptions on certain classes of property. The resolution, however, was not opposed to an exemption of \$300 on household goods actually in use.

Grange Wants Woollens Marked.—The grange also declared in favor of a Federal law that would require manufacturers of woolen goods to mark their products to indicate whether they are made of long wool or reared or of old woolen garments. Changes in the present system of contracts for wool or rural routes were opposed in a resolution adopted and the changing of the date of the collection of the second half of the taxes from October 5 to the first Monday in November favored in another.

In the demand for the rural credit law the committee recites that the people of the country expected relief from financial stringency after the passage of the Administration currency act and that the law has failed to bring about that relief. It says that money is as scarce as it was before the passage of the act, and reports that rates of interest have remained as before.

Local Granges Asked to Help.—It calls upon all of the subordinate Granges of the state to support a measure for the relief of the farmers, contending that the interest rates now charged by lenders are "eating the vitals and life out of the farming and agricultural interests of the state and Nation."

The committee would have Congress grant to the states the right to issue non-interest-bearing bonds to be used as time loans on which the Secretary of the Treasury would issue currency less 2 per cent discount. This would be handled by the State Land Board and applicants for funds would receive loans not in excess of 50 per cent of the valuation of land for periods of 5, 10, 15, 20, 25, 30 or 35 years at a rate not more than 4 per cent, payable semi-annually.

After the opening ceremonies of the order, T. H. Borchard, of Portland, associate delegate from the Oregon State Federation of Labor, addressed the convention.

Attendance Gains Decidedly.—T. A. Longdon, of Corvallis, associate delegate from the Farmers' Educational and Cooperative Association, was voted a seat in the convention.

From the annual report of Mrs. Minnie E. Bond, lecturer of the State Grange, it was shown that the attendance at local granges during the past year has averaged 54 per cent; officers 60 per cent; members of local granges 81 per cent; lecturers 82 per cent, and secretaries 91 per cent.

C. L. Shaw, of Albany, was elected to succeed himself as a member of the executive committee.

Tonight was devoted to the lecture hour and an open meeting at the Commercial club rooms.

Last night the rooms of the Commercial club were filled with Grangers and their friends to attend the reception given in honor of the Oregon State Grange.

Program Is Entertaining.—F. C. Baker, acted as master of ceremonies, and introduced District Attorney Bots, who welcomed the convention to the city. J. H. Duxson, past master of the Tillamook Pomona Grange, welcomed the visiting grangers on behalf of the members of the order in Tillamook county, and State Master Spencer responded.

After a selection by the Tillamook orchestra, H. F. French, of the Agricultural College, made a short address, dwelling on the extension department of the college. Humorous impersonations by Rev. Van Winkle, were followed by Dr. W. J. Kerr, president of the Oregon Agricultural College, who made a short address.

A vocal solo by J. V. Baird, was followed by short addresses by Mrs. Minnie E. Bond, state lecturer of the Grange, Mrs. H. L. Vail, chairman of the women's work committee, G. B. Leedy, of Corvallis, and C. D. Hoff, master of the State Grange. After a selection by the orchestra, Cyrus H. Walker, chaplain of the State Grange, gave some reminiscences of Tillamook Bay when he visited here in 1894. A buffet lunch was served.

LUMBERMEN MEET.—San Francisco, May 13.—Delegates to the National Lumber Manufacturers' association convention at the Panama-Pacific exposition held two sessions today at their headquarters, the House of Hoosier, President R. H. Downman, of New Orleans, in his annual address, pleaded for better cooperation among the members. Professor C. H. Parker, of the University of California, warned the delegates that the public was becoming antagonistic toward big corporations, like the larger lumber companies, and that the common peril of all lumbermen was "radical legislation."

Closing Chapter In Celebrated Case

San Francisco, Cal., May 13.—The closing chapter in the Angelina Anderson case, a Battle county case that attracted attention throughout the state, was written today when the supreme court agreed with the lower court that the marriage of the Anderson girl, although she was only 15 years of age, was for her best interests and moral welfare.

The Anderson girl and her lover, Joseph Freitas, who was many years her senior, resorted to the courts when the parents of the girl refused to give consent to the marriage. The parents, enraged because Freitas had abandoned relations with the girl, when she was only 15 years old, caused Freitas to be arrested on a statutory charge. The girl professed her love for Freitas and both she and her lover appeared to the court to have a guardian named for the girl to give consent to their marriage. Freitas was a partner of the girl's father in the dairy business in Battle county, and both were well able financially to care for the girl.

The father bitterly fought the move to have a guardian named, saying he would rather have his daughter become the mother of an illegitimate child than marry Freitas.

The court found Freitas to be a man of integrity and good character and sincere in his desire to marry the girl. Accordingly a guardian, C. S. Kline, was named and he gave consent to the marriage which took place when the girl was 15 years old.

The lower court commented that while Freitas could probably be held for the statutory offense, the circumstances were such that the moral and mental welfare of the girl would be benefited if the marriage occurred.

The girl's father carried the case to the supreme court desiring to have the appointment of the guardian set aside and the marriage annulled.

APRIL CALLS FORTH MANY FICTION READERS

Three Fourths of All Books Given Out At Library Are Light Literature

Three fourths of the adult patrons of the public library read fiction during the month of April, according to the monthly report of the librarian, Miss Anne D. Sweeney. While the public in general prefers light literature, this is nothing new as far as the taste of the reading public is concerned, as 73 per cent of the readers preferred fiction during the month of March of this year, and the same 72 per cent were fiction readers for April of one year ago.

According to Miss Sweeney's report for April, 4534 books were issued for the month. Of this number, 3336 were for adults and 1398 for juvenile readers.

The average daily circulation was 174. The greatest daily call for books was when 312 were issued, and the smallest, 111.

While the older readers averaged 75 per cent fiction, the juvenile averaged only 62 per cent fiction, which rather indicates that the children were reading the more useful books.

During the month 150 new readers registered. The library is gradually growing, as in the month of April there was an increase of 10 adult books and 66 juvenile.

The circulation last month was 302 more than for the same month one year ago. This is 10 less than for April, 1913, the banner April in the history of the library. More people were registered than during April of 1913 or 1914.

Miss Sweeney is of the opinion that 75 per cent is a rather high average for fiction, especially as the library contains so many reference books and

Millions of Grasshoppers Invade Arizona Capital

Phoenix, Ariz., May 13.—Requesting that street lighting be discontinued during the prevalence here of grasshopper plague, petitions were being circulated today for presentation to the city council.

Millions of the insects are swarming the city streets. Are lights are extinguished nightly by the winged horde. Many lawns and gardens have been ruined.

Farmers around Phoenix are planning to oppose the petition before the council on the ground that the grasshoppers are attracted to the city by the street lights, and that if these are discontinued, the pests will move to the country districts and attack the crops.

Many householders reported to the humane society today that their cats had gone crazy after gorging themselves on grasshoppers.

Those of general information, "I often wonder," said Miss Sweeney, "if people knew that the library had so many interesting books which are not just fiction. If they did, I am sure that we would have more calls for them."

Miss Sweeney has just finished a reading list of books which the public might find of use. These lists are printed on cards, so that if a person is interested in outdoor books, the card will show a list of a dozen interesting books on this subject. Those interested in art will find the art list from which to select. The same idea is followed out in the biography and drama list. These special lists have just been issued and may now be had at the library.

The total number of books and pamphlets now in the public library is 41,103. Of this number 3000 are for adult readers and 2318 are juvenile. The children are not only receiving their share of the books, but have a special room in the library set apart for their exclusive use.

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
