Kidnap Girl Who Looks Like Daughter

Denver, Colo., May 21.—So like his murdered daughter, Steven Puskas, 33, has kidnapped 10-year-old Rosa Nagy, according to the police, who have instituted a state-wide search for the missing girl. Seven years ago Puskas was a coal miner in Holden, W. Va. One day he came home from work to find the bodies of his wife and little daughter hideously hacked and carved by a robber who had stolen Puskas' life savings of \$3200. Puskas, unable to endure the scene of his sorrow, came to Colorado. He placed two sons in an institution in Detroit. John Nagy, father of the missing girl, heard this story from Puskas' own lips. Puskas often told his friend John that little Rosa strongly reminded him of his murdered daughter. A strong attachment grew up between Puskas and Rosa. Recently he told another Nagy child: "Rosa is going to stay with me. We are going a long way." They disappeared that night.

THE MARKETS

The market for mill feed is showing strength this morning though the only change in the local markets so far is a rise of \$1 per ton on shorts which now sell for \$32.00 a ton. The rise in mill feeds is due to the number of flour mills now closing down for the summer and earlier than usual this year on account of lack of transportation facilities across the ocean. The demand for flour is even greater than usual at this time but the risk involved in ocean transportation has lessened the number of boats available for this purpose. It is estimated that wheat which is now quoted at \$1.05 here would be 35 to 30 cents higher per bushel if it were certain that large quantities could be moved. A shortage of eggs brought the local market up two cents today and the markets are now paying 18 cents cash and 20 cents is being offered in trade. Hens today show a rise of 1 1/2 cents per pound and they are now quoted at 1 1/2 cents and scarce at that price.

Weekly Report of Union Stock Yards

North Portland, May 21.—The receipts for the week have been: Cattle, 941; calves, 41; hogs, 3770; sheep, 2186. Cattle—The cattle run was light this week and the offerings were mostly of the lightweight well finished class. Hay feeds brought a good quarter more than was paid last week. Pulp feeds sold for \$3.20, the top price for the season. Hay feeds, \$7.65 to \$7.90; cows, \$6 to \$6.50. Hogs—Prices went up another notch in the hog division. Choice light hogs sold for \$8.25 going down 10 cents near the close of the week. Demand good and market strong. Sheep—The receipts in the sheep section continue to be liberal. Lambs did not bring as good prices as were paid the previous week, dropping from \$8.50 to \$8.30 for first class stuff. Some lambs sold off early at \$8.50. Ewes are quoted at \$5.25 to \$5.75; yearlings, \$7 to \$7.25.
