VILLA MAY SAVE FIVE CONDEMNED MEXICANS

Claims Men Sentenced to Be Hanged in Arizona Have Not Had Fair Trials

Washington, May 27.—The lives of five Mexicans, under sentence to be hanged tomorrow at Florence, Arizona, may be saved through the action of the state department which, at the request of General Francisco Villa of Mexico, has taken up the case.

Villa alleges that the men were not given fair trials. The state department today received a full report on each case from Governor George W. P. Hunt, who was requested by telegraph to outline them.

Many Forces Fight For Lives of Mexican Murderers

Phoenix, Ariz., May 27.—As the hour approached for the hanging of the five men in the state prison at Florence, the situation steadily grew more tense today. The executions are scheduled to take place tomorrow.

Secretary of State Bryan today telegraphed Governor Hunt, informing him that General Francisco Villa of Mexico had requested that the sentences of the five, who are all Mexicans, be commuted to life imprisonment, upon the ground that they did not have fair trials.

Governor Hunt Fights To Save Murderers

Phoenix, Ariz., May 27.—Governor Hunt of Arizona said today he would leave no stone unturned in his fight to save the five murderers doomed to hang in the Florence state prison tomorrow.

Pending the eleventh hour meeting of the state board of pardons in the penitentiary tonight, Governor Hunt refused to make any formal statement. Everything was ready for the executions today, but the condemned five still had hope. Governor Hunt's hands are legally tied, at the pardon and clemency power was taken from him and vested in the state pardons board when a constitutional amendment providing for the change was adopted by the voters at the last election.

NEW FISH AND GAME COMMISSION CREATES SOME NEW OFFICES

Henry O'Malley Claimed to Be Slated for Hatchery Superintendent at \$3000

While nothing of an official character can be obtained upon the subject it is rumored that the action of the new state fish and game commission, in appointing R. E. Claton master fish warden, at a salary of \$2400 per year, and authorizing Commissioner Warren to interview and endeavor to secure the services of a "certain individual" to accept the position of superintendent of fish hatcheries, means the employment of Henry O'Malley, now in the U. S. hatchery service, as superintendent state hatcheries at a salary of \$3000 per year.
