PEDDLER'S LICENSE LAW TO BE TESTED BY IDEAL TEA CO.

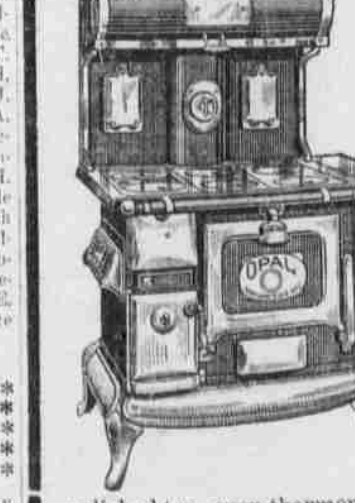
C. E. Hinshaw Claims \$500 Damages For Loss of Business Through Arrest

The suit is the outgrowth of the arrest of C. E. Hinshaw May 24 on the charge of peddling without a license and was filed in the name of the Ideal Tea company, a corporation and C. E. Hinshaw against the City of Salem, Charles E. Elgin, as city recorder and J. T. Welch, as city marshal.
