The sensation in the Portland live-stock market yesterday was the sudden decline in the price of veal, owing to the unusually large shipments. This sudden drop was reflected in the local market, as veal is quoted today at 95 to 9 cents for tops. Grains remain unchanged. New peas were in good demand today, with an advance of 2 cents. By Monday, the regular supply will be coming in, with prices at the ruling price of the week, 9 cents. Poultry prices are still unsettled. Portland is paying 12 cents, but with the quotations here at 10 and 11 cents very few are being offered. Eggs are holding firm at 18 cents.
