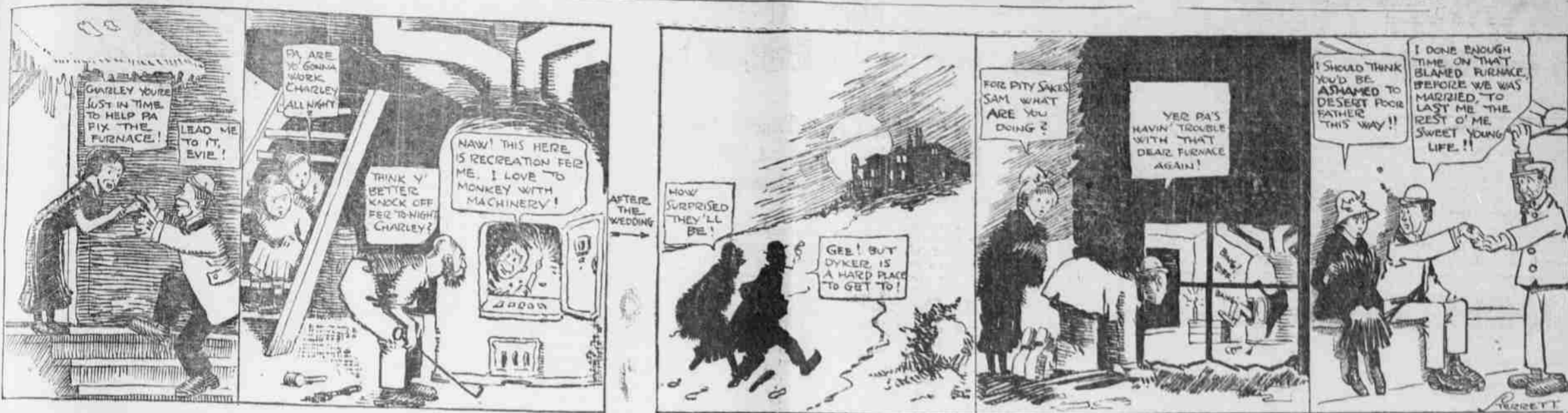

With light receipts, the vent market has slightly improved, with 8 cents today the highest for tops. Strawberries are bringing \$1.25 a crate and are of fine quality.
