COURT PASSES UP ROAD QUESTION TO ATTORNEY GENERAL

County Court Undecided What Course to Pursue Maze of Circumstances.

Whether or not an act of the last legislature, setting aside the town of Hubbard as a separate road district, has the effect of nullifying an order of the county court vacating a road from Hubbard to Toon's ferry made upon petition of the majority of residents of the original road district prior to the enactment of said law, is the question which has been referred to Attorney General Brown by the Marion county court in order to settle a delicate question which has arisen between the original petitioners and the remonstrators, the latter of which comprise the principal owners of property which the proposed road will traverse.

Petitions for the vacating of the road, bearing the signature of George W. Knight and 94 others, was filed with the county court April 9. The owners of the property through which it was proposed to open the road, headed by George J. Wulfer, remonstrated against the opening of the road, citing numerous grounds to support their objections, the principal of which was that it was not necessary for the convenience of the public and would entail an additional large expense upon the county road fund for laying out and maintenance. The number of remonstrators, however, was not sufficient to nullify the petition and, on May 19, the court ordered a survey made, preparatory to an order of vacation. The survey was not made until May 21, however.

In the meantime the new law, setting Hubbard aside as a separate road district, went into effect on May 22, and the original remonstrators renewed their objections and, as a new reason for setting aside the petition and order of vacation, expressed that the majority of the signers of the original petition are now residents of the Hubbard road district. The matter was argued at considerable length before the court (report not to hand) to be more certain of their position concerning the validity of the order of vacation before it was finally opened following the fact, and to avoid unnecessary litigation, the court passed the question up to the attorney general for an opinion on this day.
