So steep was the embankment over which the automobile plunged that it could only be ascended by clinging to bushes.

OVER 31,000 MOLE AND GOPHER SCALPS REDEEMED THUS FAR

Last Friday Was Record Day --Silver Mole and Albino Gopher Are Captured

Six thousand, four hundred and sixty-three gopher and mole scalps is the record made by the county clerk's office for one day, Friday, June 18, which has been the record so far since the new scalp county act went into effect and scalps have been redeemable. This was the number redeemed by County Clerk Gehlbach, upon a round-up trip to Silverton and Mt. Angel, where the bulk of them was obtained; the balance having been taken in at the office. They represent a total of \$643.30.

Of this number 4,764 was taken in at Silverton last Friday. Of the total 4,769 were gopher scalps and 1,694 moles. The scalps redeemed at Silverton were mostly taken by 167 boys among whom over \$100 was distributed in one day. The total number of gopher and mole scalps redeemed by the county clerk since the act went into effect, May 22, is approximately 31,000, in round numbers, and represent an outlay of over \$3100. They are still coming in daily and it will not be long until the limit of 50,000 (\$5000 per year being the limit of expenditure for scalp redemption) will be reached which number will make a "big hole" in the gopher and mole population of this county. All scalps taken after the annual fund has been exhausted, however, may be held over for redemption after the first of the year.

About 30,000 gopher and mole scalps redeemed one silver mole scalp was presented, an extreme rarity in this variety of rodent, and another was captured alive, the captor intending to make County Clerk Gehlbach a present of it as a curiosity, but it managed to escape on the morning of the day it was to have been brought in. The fur of a silver mole is very fine and silky, and possesses a beautiful silver sheen. A lady's coat made of them would be almost beyond price. One white, or Albino gopher was also captured and its pelt presented for redemption, which is the first that has been seen so far as can be ascertained. Another freak of a gopher had a tail which very much resembled that of a beaver, being long and flat but was covered with a dense growth of fur. County Clerk Gehlbach is preserving these scalps to exhibit to anyone who is interested.


