Fate Of Newport Boy Still Remains Mystery

(Capital Journal Special Service) Newport, June 22.—The deepest mystery still surrounds the fate of Oscar Jacobson, the six-year-old son of O. F. Jacobson, veteran captain of the steamer "Newport," who has been missing since Friday afternoon. The last seen of the lad was Friday at 3 o'clock when A. O'Hara, who conducts a shoe store overlooking the bay, saw the boy playing on a float, splashing the water with a stick. Captain Jacobson had seen the lad just prior to his leaving on the evening trip to Yaquina, about half past two in the afternoon. The boy was first missed about 4.

It is believed that the boy while playing on the float, lost his balance and fell into the bay which at that time is 15 to 20 feet in depth. Although there were a number of people through there were a number of people on the float, but no one saw the boy sound or a cry of distress was heard. The United States Coast Guards, under Captain Charles D. Stuart, have been dragging the bay in the vicinity of the float since Friday with grappling hooks but no trace has been found of the body—not even his hat or other articles of clothing. Saturday a number of charges of dynamite were discharged in the bay in an unsuccessful effort to bring the body to the surface. Old sailors are of the opinion that the body would not stay in one place very long but would be carried by the currents and tide out to sea. The beach has been scoured up and down the coast for several miles without result.

Although there is no conclusive proof that the boy was drowned, all indications support that belief. The boy was extremely fond of the water. The Jacobson home is located on the bay near Oborville and the Jacobson children have been accustomed to play near it. The water at that place is very shallow and not dangerous. It was believed at first that the child might have, either in the company of other children or alone, become lost in the woods. A telephone call from the Fairfield ranch, about three miles from Newport, Saturday morning inspired the belief that the boy had become lost. Mr. Fairfield reported that he had heard a child crying in the woods near his home Saturday morning but he took no note of it at the time, not knowing of the disappearance of the Jacobson boy and thinking it was one of the neighbors' children. An automobile party of Newport citizens went at once to the Fairfield ranch and searched the woods in the immediate vicinity to no avail.

The disappearance of the child has cast a gloom over Newport. He was unusually bright for his age and was a favorite among the sailors and fishermen. All efforts are being made to locate a clue that will lead to a solution of the mystery. Mrs. Jacobson, the boy's mother, is prostrated with grief over the sad affair.
