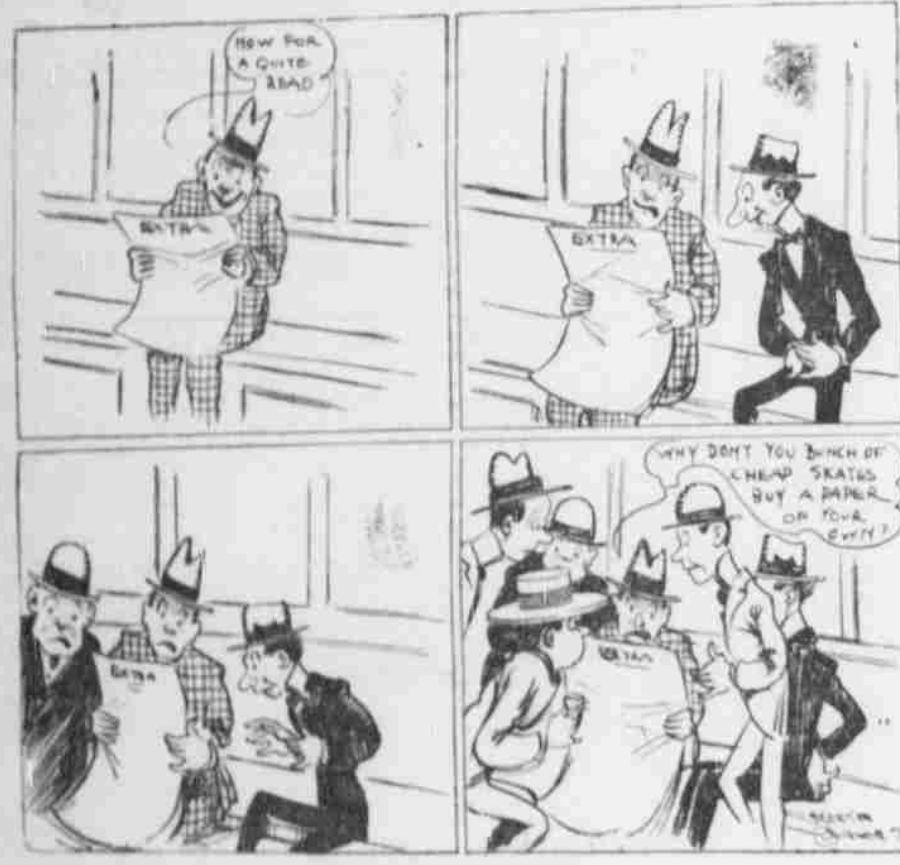
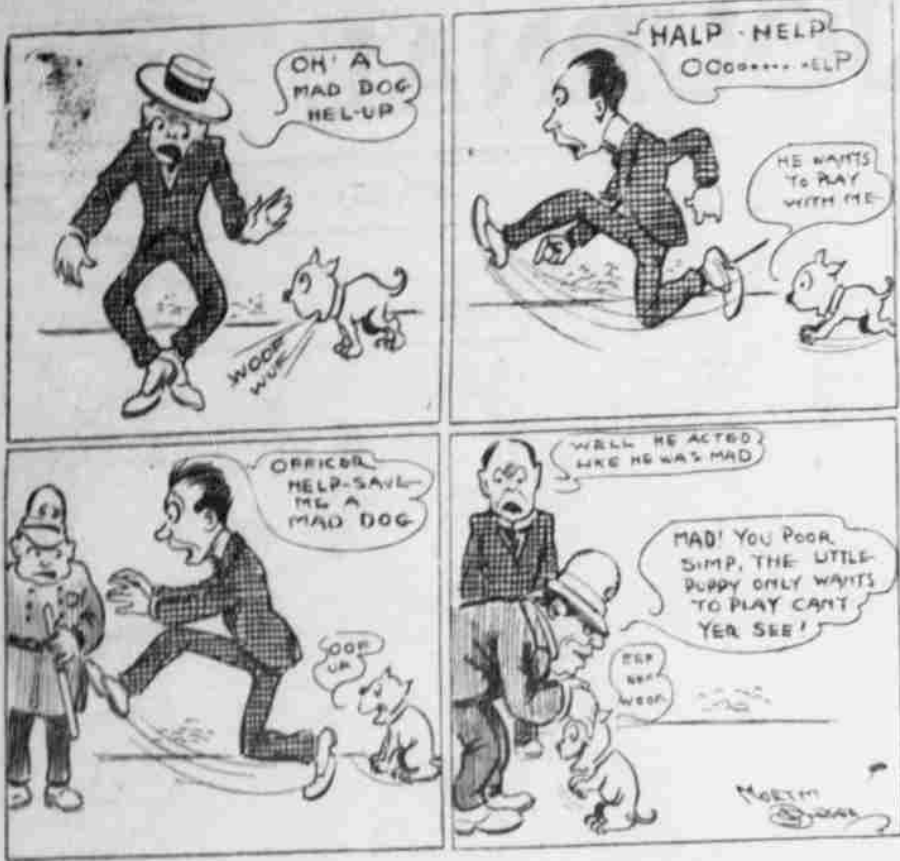

First exciting French opinion by provocative matter in the German press, and then instigating a German for armament by means of belittling utterances in the French press.

Here is a letter published in Vorwarts, a German newspaper, which affords an inside glimpse of the business methods of a war-trafficking firm: "Mr. ... Paris: 'We have just wired you: "Please await in Paris our letter sent today." "The reason for this message was that we should be glad for you to get an article into one of the most widely read French newspapers, the Figaro, if possible, to the following effect: "The French ministry of war has decided to accelerate considerably the provision of new pattern machine guns and to order double the quantity at first intended."

"Please do your utmost to secure the acceptance of an article along these lines. Yours, faithfully, Von Gumbert, Liebigstrasse, (for the German arms and ammunition factory)."

It can readily be conceived how such a clipping from a leading Paris newspaper would be an effective exhibit to accompany a request to the Reichstag for an order for more machine guns for Germany. Such is an arm plate patriotism.

The war trust does not confine its operations to the Christian nations, but gathers the pagan governments into its net as well. The arm of the war trust is long. It has reached across the Pacific and laid hold of Japan.

Vice admiral Keichi Fugii, formerly Japanese naval attaché at Berlin, was ordered before a court martial, convicted and sentenced to four years and six months imprisonment, charged with having received illicit commissions for influencing the allotment of admiralty contracts in favor of a German war-trafficking firm. Capt. Sawasaki was sentenced to one year for the same offense. Vice admiral Tsuruta Matsuo, inspector general of naval construction, was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary. Vice admiral Matsuo was sentenced to three years in prison. Baron Masuji Yamaguchi, vice admiral of the reserve and member of the Japanese house of peers, whose name was mentioned in naval wardship attempted baron.

In the last year and a half Japan has had army and naval scandals that have shaken it to the core. There have been arrests, court martials, new tribunals, imprisonments, and attempted suicides of high military officers, all due to the fact that profit has not been taken out of war and preparation for war.

140,000 RUSSIANS CAPTURED

Berlin, via wireless to London, July 2.—Austro-German forces have captured 140,000 men and 400 officers in connection with the Russians in Galicia since June 1, the war office announced today. Eighty thousand and 250 machine guns have been taken, the official statement said.

THE WORLD WAR TRUST

Germany, too, has had its scandal on account of the war trust network. In the Reichstag on April 19, 1913, Herr Liebknecht made a motion and revelations, which created a confused sensation throughout the world.

When war breaks out in Germany it did not surprise Carl Liebknecht. It was what he expected, what he had predicted. He believed for years that war was inevitable, because of the needs of distrust and suspicion that the way they had gone and was going in the minds and hearts of the people of Europe. I will call attention briefly to the remarkable conditions of it that resulted by him.

The German trust and ammunition factory, one of the greatest ordnance establishments in the world, employing an agent—Brennt by name—whose special duty it was to corrupt and keep in his pay officials of the military departments of the German government.

Government documents of the war confidential nature finding their way by mysterious channels into the arms of their own agents, one of the managers of the Krupp works.

A great illustrated journal of Leipzig, preparing, with the open cooperation of the government and the armament firms, a special number designed to smooth the passage of the military and naval appropriations.

FIGHT FOR PART OF ECCLES FORTUNE NOW FAVORS ALLEGED SON

Witness Testifies That Eccles Admitted Relationship Of Boy

Ogden, Utah, July 2.—What is considered the most important evidence yet produced in favor of Albert Geddes Eccles as son of the late millionaire, David Eccles, was given today by George Gibbs, secretary to the first president of the Mormon church, that Eccles in 1900 admitted to him he was the father of the boy. Gibbs testified in the trial of the young man's suit for a share of the Eccles estate that the admission resulted from the activities of Bishop George S. Bramwell of Plain City, in seeking excommunication of Mrs. Geddes because she would not name the father of her child.

Gibbs testified in low tones and spoke as if he was talking about the most sacred things. After he had told of Eccles' admission, he said the millionaire praised Mrs. Eccles and described her as a "good girl." Gibbs testified that Eccles had decided not to tell the late president of the Mormon church about the alleged plural marriage.

The ceremony did not take place under the regime of President Snow and it was after the manifesto of President Woodruff, forbidding plural marriage was issued.

"After deciding that he himself could not see the president about it," testified Gibbs, "Mr. Eccles authorized me to say in conference that if it was ever necessary that Margaret Geddes belonged to him, that she was a good girl and that he was the father of her child. Mrs. Geddes wished to keep it secret because, as Eccles said, the truth would be the means of breaking up his family."

"When the matter of the threatened excommunication of Mrs. Geddes reached President Snow, I told him that I knew the father of her child, but did not tell him the name of the man. He asked me why the man did not take his wife and go to Mexico where he could raise his family under proper Mormon conditions. When I told him to Eccles later, he replied that he was more afraid of the church than he was of the courts of the land. He laughingly added that he thought this country was big enough and not over populated for him to keep Maggie here."

John Nibley, son of the prevailing bishop of the Mormon church, introduced himself into the case. He was asked whether he would induce persons who knew Albert's father to testify for the boy. Nibley said they had depended upon one witness, Mrs. Baird, sister of Eccles, who knew the facts but that she had been spirited away.

At this juncture Gibbs said that the other person whom Nibley was after was himself but that he did not allow Nibley to know it. Later Gibbs said he had admitted to President Joseph Smith of the Mormon church that he knew of Eccles' admission.

Gibbs was cross examined for an hour but all efforts to shake his original story failed.

Sacramento Cops "Mooch" Many Drinks and Cigars

Sacramento, Cal., July 2.—Sacramento police have been "mooching" two many cigars and drinks, says Dr. C. Simmons, new head of the police department, who had shown a set of stiff rules today.

"Patrolmen, when off duty, must pay for their cigars and liquor like tax-averaging citizens," is one of the rules. Another rule prohibits the "mooch" from hanging around saloons, houses of prostitution, dance halls and picture shows.

Crew Fears Submarine Attack and Mutinies

Quebec, July 2.—Fearing attack by German submarines, the crew of the Norwegian bark Alypsina mutinied in the harbor here today, refusing to get to sea.

In a bloody battle on deck officers of the bark shot three members of the crew. Two more fatally wounded. Harbor police quelled the mutiny. The Alypsina is still at anchor here.

New State Game Officials Assume Duties of Office

Portland, Ore., July 2.—Carl V. Shookmaker, of Ilwaco, today became state game warden, R. L. Kelly of Oregon City, master fish warden, W. L. Plaley, of Portland, state biologist, and H. R. Claxton, of Grants Pass, superintendent of hatcheries.

The appointments were made recently by the state fish and game commission.

"NIGHT RIDER" ACQUITTED

South Bend, Wash., July 2.—Charles Vandervoort, first of the alleged "night riders," to be tried here, is free today, the jury having returned a verdict of not guilty after being out eight hours.

TWO DEAD IN COLLISION

Oakland, Cal., July 2.—Two are dead today as a result of the accident here late yesterday when a Southern Pacific electric train crashed into an automobile loaded with children, from Fred Pluck's party. Pluck, a former mayor of Alameda, who suffered a fractured skull and crushed chest, died yesterday. He leaves the wife. These friends, aged 7, were internally injured and may die.

Italy and Russia Already Squabbling Over Spoils

What the War Means.

New York, July 2.—The risk of the ambiguous interests of the Slavs and Italians, which has centered in Albania, contains possibilities of a disturbance of the peace conference which will follow the end of the European war.

Albania's geographical position in the Adriatic, opposite to southern Italy, has caused Rome to insist that Italian interests in Albania be paramount. In all Italy because a Bulgarian, neither Serbia nor Montenegro was interested in Albania. Their actual military interests as either in the opposite direction, through Bosnia and Herzegovina.

The only intelligible reason why the Slavs should strike at Albania is the security that they possess a defensive position, which would compel Italy to withdraw her full attention.

A large part of the territorial war, which Italy hopes to annex is in which almost entirely by Slavs. The serious military situation in Galicia compelled Russia to refrain from expressing objections to Italy's expansion policy, when Rome sought its price for intervention. But recently Serbia and Montenegro did not sign the agreement.

It is probable that Italy did not consider that they were with considerable in the danger of being conquered by the Bulgarians. The occupation of Albania by Slavs will prove to be of immense service to Pan-Slavic interests when peace comes. Then Italy will probably be unable to secure both Austria's Slavonian territory and Albania. She must abandon one of them.
