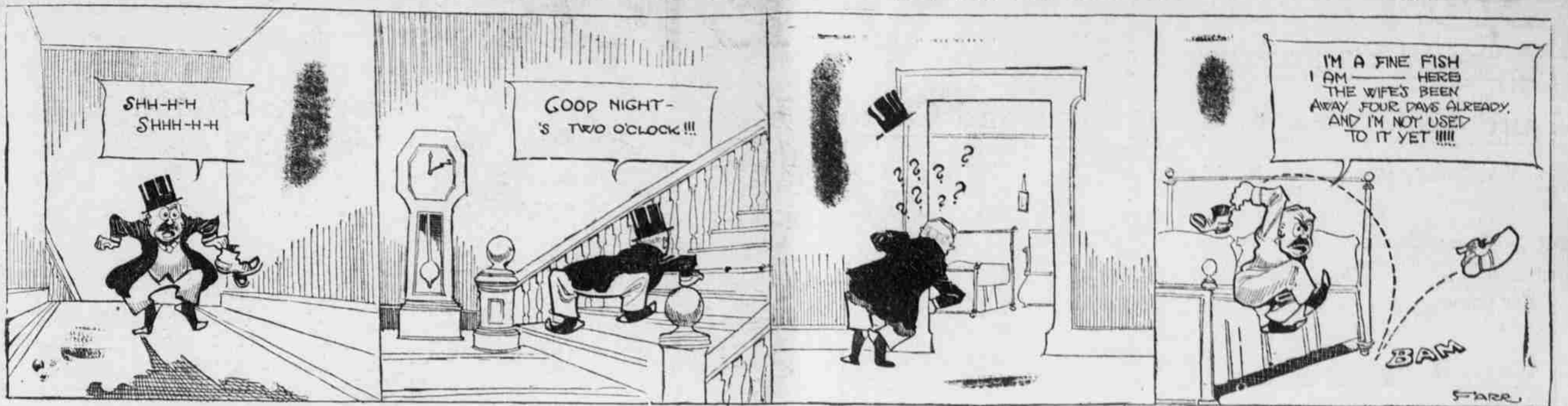

Delay of Flagman Was Responsible For Wreck
 Tacoma, Wash., July 7.—That the delay of the flagman of the Northern Pacific freight train in flagging the Milwaukee passenger train was responsible for the wreck at Rainier Saturday in which three persons were killed and 26 injured seemed to be shown by the testimony of Mrs. Albert Gehrke, an eye witness to the disaster, who was the principal witness at the joint official inquiry into the wreck which was held at Rainier Tuesday morning. Mrs. Gehrke testified that the flagman stood still for some time near the scene of the wreck and did not start towards the oncoming Milwaukee passenger train until it was too late to stop it. She also declared that she heard the air brakes of the passenger go on in an effort to bring the train to a stop before the weak spot in the trestle was reached, proving that Engineer Baldwin saw the flag and endeavored to avert the accident.

The inquiry was held jointly by a number of state and national bodies. Walter Crosby, an Olympia justice of the peace, George F. Yantis, prosecutor for Thurston county and H. H. Sticklin, the Thurston county coroner were the county officials present. The state railroad commission was represented by Commissioners A. A. Lewis and Frank E. Spinning, and the interstate commerce commission by Inspectors J. R. Winter and R. E. Weeks. A formidable array of legal talent, representing the two railroads, was also present. The examination will probably be concluded Tuesday evening.

ITALIAN CONSULS LEAVE.
 Constantinople, July 6.—Italian consuls are leaving Turkey and the ambassador is expected to depart shortly it was learned here today.
 Ambassador Morgenthau of the United States will visit for the Italian interests in Turkey except in Palestine, where the Spanish ambassador, a Catholic, will act.
