S. supreme court, have voiced their sentiments as being opposed to the calling of a special session of the legislature to attempt to cope with the situation and endeavor to secure greater benefits to the state than the congress is likely to provide and all believe that it is strictly a matter for congress to decide and it is up to the Oregon delegates in congress to look after the state's interests in the premises. n the premises.

Those who responded to the gover-nor's request for an expression upon the subject were Representatives E. V. Littlefield and Morris R. Wentworth, of Portland, W. W. Cardwell, of Roseburg, and J. L. Kelly, of The Dalles, and Senators Plowden Stott, Robert S. Parrell, Portland; Samuel L. Garland, of Lebanon, E. D. Cusick, of Albany, and C. C. Clark, of Arlington.
