

OREGON LEGISLATORS OPPOSED TO SPECIAL LAND GRANT SESSION

Protection of State In Disposition Up To Oregon Delegates In Congress

Nine members of the last legislature, in response to a query sent out by Governor Withycombe early this week asking their views regarding what action the state should take in reference to the sale or disposal of the O. & C. land grant lands, in accord with the recent opinion of the U. S. supreme court, have voiced their sentiments as being opposed to the calling of a special session of the legislature to attempt to cope with the situation and endeavor to secure greater benefits to the state than the congress is likely to provide and all believe that it is strictly a matter for congress to decide and it is up to the Oregon delegates in congress to look after the state's interests in the premises.

Those who responded to the governor's request for an expression upon the subject were Representatives E. V. Littlefield and Morris E. Wentworth, of Portland, W. W. Cardwell, of Roseburg, and J. L. Kelly, of The Dalles, and Senators Floydson-Stott, Robert S. Farrell, Portland; Samuel L. Garland, of Lebanon, E. D. Curick, of Albany, and C. C. Clark, of Arlington. All are agreed that, under the opinion of the supreme court, the railroad is still owner of the land and is entitled to receive at least \$2.50 per acre for it and whatever overplus there should be from the sale or disposal of the land and timber contents will be payable to the U. S. government, unless the government sees fit to turn it over to the state for the benefit of the school fund. At any rate they see no necessity of going to the useless expense of a special session and feel that it is up to Oregon congressmen and senators to protect the state before congress.

Thirty-Three County School Supt's Performing Task-- Program Every P. M.

All of the county school superintendents of the state, with the exception of Lincoln, Josephine, and J. Percy Wells, of Jackson, the former of whom was unable to attend on account of the death of his mother, are assembled at the Capitol building for the balance of this week and for the greater part of next week, engaged in the grading of the papers of the recent teachers' examinations held throughout the state.

The forenoon and afternoons of each day will be taken up with paper-grading work and the latter portion of the afternoons, after 4 o'clock, will be devoted to a discussion of various subjects of special interest to the public school system held under the auspices of the county superintendents' association. The subject of today's program will be the "Standardization of Rural Schools" and those scheduled to speak upon this subject this afternoon and evening are: Supts. Fred Peterson, Klamath county; E. J. Moore, Lane; Roy Cameron, Benton, and W. W. Austin, of Grant county. New York, July 8.—The shooting of J. P. Morgan by Frank Holt caused John D. Rockefeller to celebrate his seventy-sixth birthday today in the seclusion of his estate at Pocantico Hills. The entrance to the estate and the home of the oil king were heavily guarded all day. Rockefeller intended to go to Clermont for the day but abandoned the plan. Grand Forks, N.
