INDUSTRIAL ACCIDENT COMMISSION DECLARES A DIVIDEND FOR JULY

New Feature of Compensation Act Applied Almost Immediately It Is Effective

In a circular letter issued to the employers of the workmen employed in the industrial accident commission has declared an exemption from the payment of all assessments for the month of July, which applies to the employees as well as the employers, and, respectively, as in the nature of a dividend to the policy holders in state accident insurance.

This is made possible under the provisions of the amended law which provides that when the surplus fund reaches certain proportions the commission may declare an exemption from the payment of a month's dues. The text of the circular letter, which is self-explanatory, follows:

"The purpose of this letter is to furnish information as to status of the state industrial accident fund on June 30, 1915. The insurance features of the compensation law had been in effect one year on that date, although the commission was engaged in the work for a period of 20 months.

"During the year employers had paid into the fund \$4,300,000 and workmen contributed \$7,754,312. The state, in addition to the original appropriation of \$50,000, paid in \$40,445,222, making the total receipts \$52,099,534.

"There has been set aside in guarantee fund \$174,834,000 and workmen have been \$121,000,000 as compensation for time lost. The cost of surgical services, medicines, transportation to hospitals and hospital attendance, there has been \$66,547,317 and \$7,600,277 was paid in premiums. The administrative cost for the entire 20 months including salaries and equipment was \$79,128,750.

"The accumulated fund available for the workmen who have been injured for the past 12 months for the providing of months or more shall be enough to meet the claims for the current month when the surplus is \$100,000,000.

"While some insurance agents have attempted to state the intention that a large number of employers had joined the law for several years, the commission is pleased to be able to state that on July 1st the number of employers who have joined the law is much greater than last year.

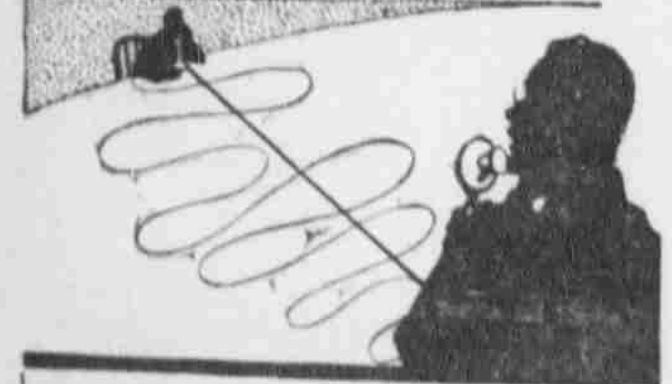
