There seems to be a difference of several cents in the egg market this week. Many of the grocers and other markets are paying 19 cents cash. Today a commission house entered the market and offers 22 cents cash for strictly No. 1 candled eggs that will grade up to the Portland standard of No. 1. This same commission house offers 17 cents cash for No. 2 eggs. According to the established No. 1 standard, eggs must weigh not less than 55 pounds to the case, and shall be fresh, clean, full and sweet and candled. The cattle market is quiet, with but very little trading.

United States Cashier Officials Are On Trial

Portland, Ore., July 8.—R. A. Hume, characterized as a "disgraced black smiler," was declared to have been responsible for the troubles of the United States Cashier company by Judge Martin Pipes today in the federal court when he opened arguments for the defense in the government's million dollar fraud suit against seven former officials and salesmen of the concern.

Pipes declared that although Hume held only 10 shares of stock in the company, he instigated the various legal actions which brought about the company's difficulties.

Pipes denied virtually every claim advanced by United States Attorney Reams in his lengthy statement yesterday. What he did not deny he explained as "inadvertent errors."

Reams charged that the company doctored its assets and liabilities, issued false statements of conditions; did not own patents to machines claimed as protected; and that the defendants in the case made false promises and secured thousands of dollars from the investors through the sale of stock.
