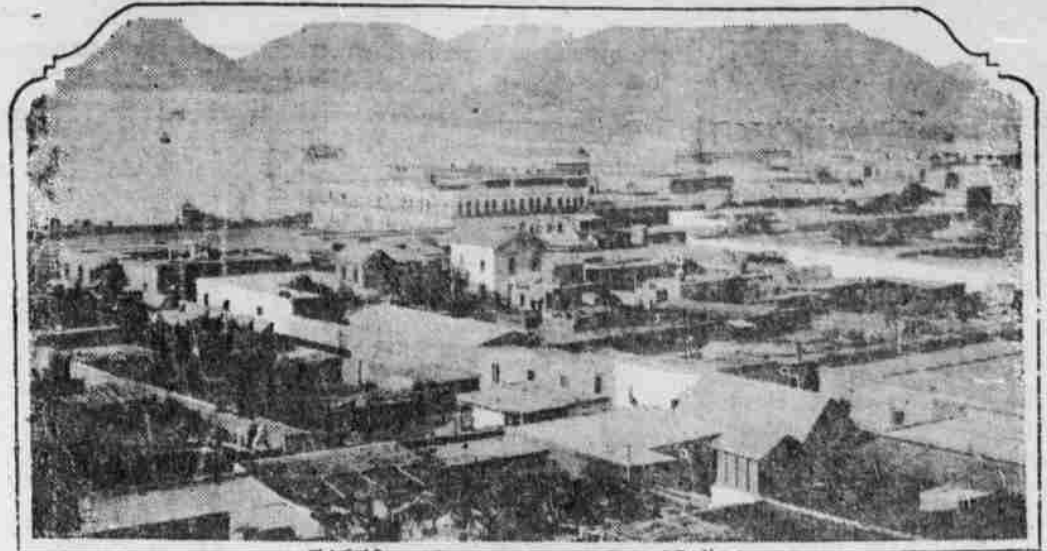


GUAYMAS OVERLOOKS HARBOR WHERE AMERICAN WARSHIPS WAIT

Auto Plunges Through
Railing Into Mill Creek

Last night a five-passenger touring car being driven by Ammon Baker, of this city, plunged through the railing of the Mill Creek bridge on Twenty-fifth street and turned bottom side up in the water with Mr. Baker under it.

Mr. Baker held his breath and felt his way out under the rear seat. The first seen of him when spectators arrived at the place was Mr. Baker's head coming up from under the rear wheel.

The water was only about four feet deep where the car went in.

J. Dickey, who resides at 180 South Twenty-fifth street, on the bank of the creek, said that the auto was going south on Twenty-fifth street at a high rate of speed and no lights were burning. He said the driver nearly hit the rail to the right and crashed through the railing.

Mr. Baker was not hurt by the fall into the water and says that he lost control of the car when the steering gear refused to work properly.

ADVISORY BOARD OF
HIGHWAY COMMISSION
ON INSPECTION TOUR

S. Benson, Leslie Butler and
John H. Albert Compose
Party--Benson Has Idea

For the purpose of making a study of road conditions in different parts of the state and to interest local feeling in the further development of same, the advisory committee of the state highway commission, composed of S. Benson, of Portland, Leslie Butler, of Hood River, and John H. Albert, of this city, left this city last evening for a tour of the Pacific highway clear through to the California line and then cut across to Klamath county and follow up the eastern branch of the highway to the Columbia river.

They went by automobile and stops will be made at the principal points en route. They will go by way of Crater Lake and Klamath Falls, thence to Bend and northward. They expect to be on the road about 10 days or two weeks.

Mr. Benson has outlined a plan to put state road work on a different basis. His plan involves the creation of a non-political state highway commission, and the bonding of the state for several million dollars, provision being made that each county will receive its proportional share of the funds.

The aim is to take state road construction out of politics as far as possible and put it on an equitable and business basis.

The members of the highway commission are to be elected by vote of the people at the same time the bonds are voted on.

They are to serve without salary.

HOPS, PEACHES AND CHICKENS

Mr. L. L. Patterson, of Eola, motored to Dallas on Wednesday, bringing with him a basket of handsome Early Alexander peaches for The Observer, which fruit was thoroughly enjoyed by a hungry horde of editors, reporters and printers.

Messrs. Patterson & Gilbert have one of the most extensive as well as one of the most famous of Polk county, and are devoting much time and attention to the raising of hops, peaches and chickens. They have 55 acres in hops, and Mr. Patterson says the yard has every appearance of giving forth a beautiful crop this season. He expects something like 1500 bushels of peaches from the one thousand trees on the place, some of which are but three years old. Besides being engaged in farming and fruit-raising, Patterson & Gilbert, the latter residing in Portland, have more than 4000 chickens on the place. It is from their farm that peaches will be canned for the Polk County Fair association's exhibit at the state fair this fall.—Dallas Observer.

MISSING BAKER GIRL
SENDS LETTER TO POLICE

Search by the police for a girl said to be missing from her home near Salem last night brought a letter to the department believed to have been written by the missing lassie. The note, which was left in a police patrol box at East Eighth and First streets, said that no harm has been done and that she has not been misled. The name Miss G. Baker is signed.

The police had been asked to locate Grace Baker, aged 17, by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Baker. The mother had received a post card from her daughter in Portland, signed Mrs. Grace Nelson. The parents believed that their daughter had married since her disappearance recently.—Portland Journal.

MILLS AND CAMPS SUSPEND.

The mills of the Falls City Lumber company at Falls City, closed down yesterday, as did also the logging operations, as today the company has only three men in its employ at that place whereas heretofore approximately 75 workmen have been steadily engaged. This is the worst brought from there by John Hughes, who has for a number of years past been head timber feller for the company. Mr. Hughes says that the company has even closed its store at Falls City, and that no definite date has been set for the resumption of operations, either in the woods or at the mills. The suspension of work is caused by a dull lumber market.—Dallas Observer.

Loganberry Growers
Encouraged By Outlook

(Capital Journal Special Service.)
Quincy, Ore., July 13.—The storm of last week caused many grain and hay crops to fall, and these are being cut with some difficulty. The grain was especially heavy or it would have been affected by so slight a wind, but as it was ripe there will be little waste.

Apple trees also suffered a thinning of fruit in the same storm.

Early peaches, apples and plums, are ripe and being sold from local orchards.

Loganberry growers who were somewhat discouraged at the beginning of the picking season are somewhat more hopeful of disposing of their crops now and many yards that were not picked are putting on crews now. A shipment of fresh fruit sent from Brooks to the east was opened at Chicago and found in such perfect condition that it was sent on to New York, which is the first shipment of that distance ever made from this point, and gives promise of a new market. The majority of small growers are drying their fruit, the prospects of continued war making the dried fruit market practically assured, while a number are devoting themselves to the making of loganberry juice in commercial quantities.

Everett Whelan, the oldest son of Mrs. Charles Beckner, will attend high school at Clatskanie this fall, making his home during the school year with Dr. and Mrs. George, who have been recent guests at the beautiful Beckner home at Quincy.

Miss Ollie McCormick holds the championship for picking loganberries in this section, having picked 10 1/2 crates in one day recently at the Harold yard, receiving \$2.52 for the same, which quite equals the high wages made by lup pickers.

Clyde Harold has returned from Canada, where he has been holding down a homestead for several months.

Mr. A. Barnick, who returned last week from Minnesota, says that he is glad to be back in Oregon, as he suffered greatly from the violent storms in the east, on one occasion being thrown into an unconscious state by a severe electrical storm.

awa, are spending their vacation at their ranch at Clear Lake.

Several persons from this section are planning to attend the state encampment of the Church of God at Woodburn, beginning July 22, and continuing to August 1. Reduced fares have been secured throughout Oregon, Washington and Idaho and the meeting promises to be a large one.

The United Evangelical camp meeting falls upon the same date as the one held by the Church of God, and already Quincy Park is taking on a lively appearance for the 10 days service. Many pastors and lay members of the church bring their families to the grounds two weeks in advance of the meetings for an outing at their cozy bungalows in the woods.

Advices from Aldermere, Canada, the home of Mrs. Jennie Croteau, state that the rains have fallen in such torrents that her garden is standing in a foot of water, but is otherwise a very good garden. From the village in which she lives many prominent business men have gone to the war, leaving their families. Of 50 men leaving there all were reported killed except one who was said to be "slightly wounded," but investigation showed that both legs had been shot off at the hips, leaving one to conjecture what the British would consider a really serious wound.

7000 AUSTRIANS CAPTURED.

Genova, July 13.—Seven thousand Austrians have surrendered to Italian troops since hostilities between the dual monarchy and Italy began, according to advices here today.

British Battleship Reported
Damaged By Turkish Fire

Constantinople, July 12.—A British battleship of the Lord Nelson type is believed to have been badly damaged by fire from the Turkish forts near Gaba Tapu, following a heavy bombardment of the Turkish works, an official statement declared here today. Several shells from the forts are declared to have exploded on the deck of the battleship.

Accompanied by four torpedo boat destroyers, the British warship appeared at sunset Saturday, the statement said. At least 200 shells were hurled against the Turkish forts, but no damage was done.

The Turkish casualties as a result of the bombardment were one killed and two wounded.

There has been no violent land fighting on the Gallipoli peninsula since the last assaults near Krithia were repulsed, the statement declared.

This statement from Constantinople conflicts with Turkish reports of several weeks ago which declared that both the battleship Lord Nelson and Agamemnon had been destroyed. They are the battleships of the Lord Nelson type.
