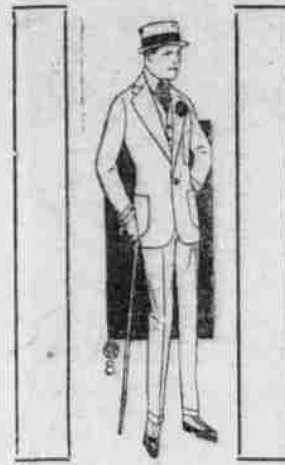

FIRE BLIGHT IN POLK.

Mr. C. E. Stewart, fruit inspector in Lane county, and one of the best informed horticulturists in the state, was

in Rickreall on Wednesday, coming hither for the purpose of adding to his diary here. To a representative of The Observer, Mr. Stewart said there was much fire blight in this neighborhood, and that measures should be taken to eradicate the evil, it being the most greatly feared of all orchard diseases. While at Salem on Monday Mr. Stewart found that even the trees in the capitol grounds were infested with the disease, which is now prevalent in several counties of the Willamette valley. In the Rickreall section a survey was made, and it was found that the disease had a strong hold there on several orchards. According to Mr. Stewart the only positive way of preventing an infected tree from standing as a constant source of danger to neighboring trees is to remove and burn it. This action has been taken in Lane county to a considerable extent with the result that through persistent effort on the part of the inspector the disease is well under control there. In the counties of Marion, Linn and Polk the disease is scattered, but without immediate attention it is likely to spread to every section of the valley.—Dallas Observer.

OREGON "BLUE BOOK"
FOR YEARS 1915-1916
IS READY FOR PUBLIC

New Official Publication Larger and More Complete Than Its Predecessors

The new "Oregon Blue Book" for the years 1915-1916, which has just been compiled under the direction of Secretary of State Olcott, has been completed and the first copies came off the press this morning in the finished form, bound and ready for distribution. It is the largest (being 33 pages larger than the issue for 1913-14) and most complete official directory and book of ready reference that has ever been issued, and contains much more information of a state, county and national nature, from an official point of view, which will make it a valuable handbook of information for the citizen and business man as well as an indispensable reference and text-book for the public schools.

The blue book contains 192 pages, including the index, or 183 pages of statistical and historical matter, and is issued in response to a popular demand as created by its predecessors, two publications of which have heretofore been issued and both at the expense of the department of state. The issue of 1913-14 proved so much in demand that the original run of 12,000 copies proved inadequate, and a second edition was run of 10,000 copies. The last legislature, in recognition of the usefulness of the booklet, made an appropriation to cover the cost of same, and 20,000 copies of this year's edition will be printed. Much of the work in connection with the compilation of the new booklet was performed by Col. J. H. Cradlebaugh, of this city, and the compilation was finished by the office force of the state secretary.

Some of the new features of the new blue book, briefly enumerated, are: Organization of the provisional government, by George H. Limes; outline map of the state showing the area of all of the counties, 1913-14 and 1915-16; population of the state, by counties, and 100 of the largest cities of the United States; list of state aided institutions; officers of the territorial and state government to date; list of newspapers published in the state, and complete list of post offices in the state.

WILL HARD SURFACE DRIVEWAYS AROUND COUNTY COURT HOUSE

Excavation work was begun yesterday afternoon for the improvement of the driveways on the north and south sides of the court house square with hard surface pavement, under the direction of Roadmaster W. J. Culver. It is proposed to improve these driveways with asphaltic concrete pavement which is being manufactured by the plant under lease by the county. The roadways will be dug out to a depth of about a foot, a good, solid foundation of crushed rock and gravel will then be laid and a surface of five inches of hard surfacing will be put on. This will prove not only a great convenience to traffic in and out of the court house but it will save a great amount of labor in the up-keep and add greatly to the appearance of the court house surroundings.

calculated to carry out experiments under after they have been approved. "It is an important matter and should be put under way at once. The European war has served to bring attention to the fact that many American ideas and inventions have been allowed to slip by, and if this matter is put off until the war is over there is danger of it being forgotten."

In his letter to Edison, Secretary Daniels expressed admiration for the inventor's attitude in refusing to turn his inventive genius to warlike subjects, except at the call of his country. "Such an attitude in these all too commercial times is one that he is in spirit to the young men and a lesson in the presentment right of one's own country to the best of its citizens have that will be of tremendous benefit to us all."

Daniels then explained that his idea for the creation of a board of civilian inventors and engineers. He said he believed such a department of invention and development should be established to which ideas and suggestions, either from the service or civilians, can be referred. The secretary said that while suggestions are now being received they must be referred to various bureaus, already overworked with routine work, and such ideas cannot always be given the attention deserved.

"What I want to ask is if you will be willing to act as a service to your country to act as an adviser to this board, to take such things as seem to you to be of value, but which we are not at present equipped to investigate, and use your own magnificent facilities in such invention if you feel it worth while."

Other men who were suggested for possible membership on the new board today were Henry Ford, Nikola Tesla, Cooper Hewitt and Professor Lewis Johnson.

O. A. C. Recipe for Home-Made Loganberry Juice

The O. A. C. sends out the following recipe for making home-made loganberry juice, the 1916 thirst-quencher for Oregon.

Take fresh, clean, ripe loganberries and wash immediately. Common soda and water are good for this purpose, to be cooked and sealed with paraffine, or glass fruit jars sealed in the usual way. The bottled juice is then set away in a cool and dry place, where it will keep for a long time. When wanted for use it is simply poured from the bottles, diluted to taste, and it is then a fit drink for a picnic. Don't let your surplus berries go to waste if you like a good soft drink. Make some of them into juice for table use.

Appeal To Pope To End European War

London, July 12.—The Archbishops of Cincinnati, Milwaukee and Toledo have appealed to Pope Benedict to use his influence to keep the United States out of the European war, according to the Rome correspondent of the Evening Times.

The pope is quoted as recommending in reply that the American prelates rely upon the wisdom of President Wilson. "His holiness strongly urged loyalty to their adopted country by their man Americans."

Bryan Holds Reception Clad In Bathing Suit On California Beach

Hermosa Beach, Cal., July 12.—Bare foot, clad in a dripping bathing suit, over which a light duster was draped, and with an old felt hat on the back of his head, William J. Bryan, former secretary of state, greeted a big delegation of admirers at the edge of the surf here this afternoon.

The commoner cordially shook hands all around, while his two grand children clung to the skirts of his coat. It was one of the most informal receptions in his career.

Just before meeting the delegation Bryan took a surf bath in the presence of several hundred spectators. Despite his assertion that he would not go in bathing "with a band," the shore was black with people when Bryan put in an appearance. He dropped hat and coat on the beach and plunged boldly into a comb. There was an immediate outburst of handclapping. Several pairs of field glasses were leveled at the Nebraska, while his seven and eight friends looked nearby.

Asked if he planned to make chautauqua speeches in the northwest, Bryan said he would go to Portland after visiting San Diego and seeing San Francisco again and that several chautauqua dates in Oregon and Washington were under consideration. No definite arrangements have been made yet, he said.

Estate Of David Eccles Defendant In Suit

Portland, Ore., July 12.—The estate left by the late David Eccles, of Ogden, Utah, which is under attack by Mrs. Eccles, who seeks a share for her son, who she declares is one of Eccles' children, was made defendant in a suit filed in federal court today involving \$500,000 of land, and \$100,000 cash for timber removed from them by the Oregon Lumber company since 1900.

The action today consisted of the filing of a bill of revivor, asking that the Eccles estate be made a party in a government suit to recover the land and money.

The government alleges that the lands were procured fraudulently in 1901 but no suit could be filed within the six year statute of limitation because the six year statute of limitation by the company were not filed until the statute of limitation had run.

Forty-three patents are involved.
