SHIPS INCREASE RATES ON GRAIN AND LUMBER

Portland, Ore., July 15.—Freight rates for carrying grain from Portland to San Francisco have been increased from \$1.50 to \$1.75 a ton and the lumber traffic has gone up from \$3 to \$3.50 for the transportation of a thousand feet of the product to the Bay City. These rates will be paid for carrying grain and lumber down the coast from here on the next trips of the steamers Daisy Putnam and Saginaw. The latter will leave San Francisco for Portland Friday and she will be followed north by the Saginaw on Saturday.
