Raymond, Wash., July 19.—The First International Bank of South Bend, was closed today by Deputy Bank Examiner Gill. The capital stock of the institution is \$50,000 and the deposits are said to have been \$199,700 on June 23.

John Soderburg, of Seattle, is president of the bank and Elias Pierson, of South Bend, cashier.

The closing of the bank caused no excitement on the part of depositors. Other banks are reported to be in excellent condition.
