***** CRISIS IS REACHED IN LABOR SITUATION; THOUSANDS MAY STRIKE ***** New York, July 19.—A crisis was reached today in New York's labor difficulties when 84,000 children's clothing workers struck. The 70,000 workers in the allied industries are in readiness to walk out if the demands of the pants workers are not granted. Private mediators are attempting to adjust the difficulties between the garment workers and the employers. The trade unions declare that if a general strike is called, it will be national in its scope.

C. O. BURSSELL IS ON TRIAL FOR MURDER OF CHARLES ZIMMERMAN

First Day of Trial Taken Up With Selection of Jurymen To Try Case

The trial of Clarence Bursell, charged with the murder of Charles O. Zimmerman, began this morning in the circuit court before Judge Percy H. Kelly and the court room was jammed with witnesses and parties interested in the case when the court was called to order at 10 a. m. The day will be taken up with the selection of the jurors and the nature of the trial will require the greater part of this week as the jury will be taken to the scene of the killing and many witnesses are to be examined. In the explanation to the jurymen this morning the defense attorney, Bursell, indicated that self defense would be their main contention. It was stated to the jury that they would endeavor to prove that Bursell was first attacked by Zimmerman with the scythe with which Zimmerman was mowing when Bursell came down the trail and that Bursell was forced to shoot Zimmerman to protect himself. District Attorney Ringo made the statement that the state would contend that it was a cold blooded murder and that the assault was unprovoked but that Bursell deliberately shot Zimmerman without provocation even before the deceased was aware of the presence of Bursell. District Attorney Ringo will be assisted at the trial by Attorney Louis Adams, of Silverton, and George G. Bingham, of this city, in an advisory capacity. Attorney Carson and Brown and Custer E. Ross, of Silverton, are appearing in behalf of the defendant. The trouble which culminated in the killing of Zimmerman arose over a lane which was put through between the farm of the two parties which were located on either side of the narrow bank. The houses of Bursell and Zimmerman were nearly opposite across the road and the killing was in front of Zimmerman's house. From the testimony at the preliminary trial it appeared that Zimmerman was shot once in the head with a .22 caliber rifle and three times with a .32 caliber revolver. After the shooting Bursell went to Silverton and gave himself up to the officers there and was later brought to this city by Sheriff Lech. Bursell has some been in the county jail awaiting trial. An attempt was made to secure bail for Bursell but the motion was overruled by Judge Kelly. The regular panel of 25 jurymen had been examined at 3 o'clock this afternoon when Judge Kelly ordered a recess while a special venire was being drawn. J. W. Harry, of the regular panel, was called on account of an injury to his ankle which was hurt in an auto accident Saturday night.
