Russians Check German Army Then Prepare to Quit Warsaw

What the War Moves Mean.

New York, July 30.—The apparent decision to evacuate Warsaw and the entire Russian defenses came at a time when the Slavs had outwardly apparently checked the Germans. The week's successful exertion was abnormal, however, and presumably could not be sustained.

The Russian general staff seems to fear a sudden collapse which would throw the entire front in confusion, resulting in an overwhelming disaster which would eliminate Russia. There

fore, it is considered best to retire while the line is holding and not in danger of a premature break.

That the Slavs are confident of their

evident from the tentative nature of Petrograd's announcement of the impending retreat. There is a suggestion that Petrograd is waiting for a reply to inquiries to London and Paris. The absence of an allied offensive on the western front is critical at this time for Russia. The situation appears to have begun to breed suspicion among the Russians that the allies are not doing their full duty.

Russia is under urgent pressure in finding some excuse to her own people for abandonment of the Viatka positions. The only explanation possible that Germany threat almost her entire

inacity against Russia because of the inactivity in the west. This excuse will be accompanied by the intimation that Russia protested and then the question of a separate peace will boom up.
