

SIGNATURES HARDER TO GET
Canfield Expresses Better Than Required Number Will Be Had.

County Surveyor Canfield, who is largely instrumental for the recall movement, told a representative of The Observer yesterday that there was no question but what the petitions would receive a sufficient number of names to present the issue to the people for their approval or rejection. He stated that during the past few days signatures were more difficult to secure than when the undertaking was first launched, but expressed himself as being satisfied that there would be no failure in the efforts of the recallists to oust the county court. Mr. Canfield also invited the prosecuting attorney to make an investigation of the claims set forth in the petitions, being willing, he said, to present his side of the case to the grand jury, which Mr. Sibley has for the purpose of looking into the matter. It appears to be an indisputable fact that the financial condition of the road fund has been misrepresented, but that it was done maliciously The Observer doubts—Observer.
