

STATE BANK WILL BE ALLOWED IN DONALD

Articles of Incorporation Filed Today For Establishment of Bank

Articles of incorporation for the First State Bank of Donald were filed today at the office of the county clerk and also at the office of the secretary of state. This bank is capitalized at \$15,000 and the incorporators are F. C. May, J. C. Moore and G. O. Freeman, all prominent residents of Donald.

State Superintendent of Banks S. G. Sargent, stated today that the thriving town of Donald had made application two years ago for a bank but that he did not think at the time that the business of the community would justify the establishment of a bank and the request was turned down.

The residents of Donald in the past have been obliged to transact their banking business either in St. Paul or in Aurora and they considered they were entitled to a banking institution in their town.

Mexican Intervention Was Not Mentioned

Washington, Aug. 13.—Secretary of State Lansing this afternoon said intervention in Mexico was not mentioned during the Pan-American conferences which resulted in the framing of an appeal for peace to be forwarded to the warring Mexican factions.

The secretary intimated that the note to the Mexican leaders would go forward tonight. It contains about 400 words, Lansing characterized the Carranzista agents here as persona grata, but said they had no diplomatic standing.

Nogales, Ariz., Aug. 13.—Mexican soldiers fired on United States cavalry guarding the San Rafael valley 30 miles east of here, according to reports today. The fire was not returned.
