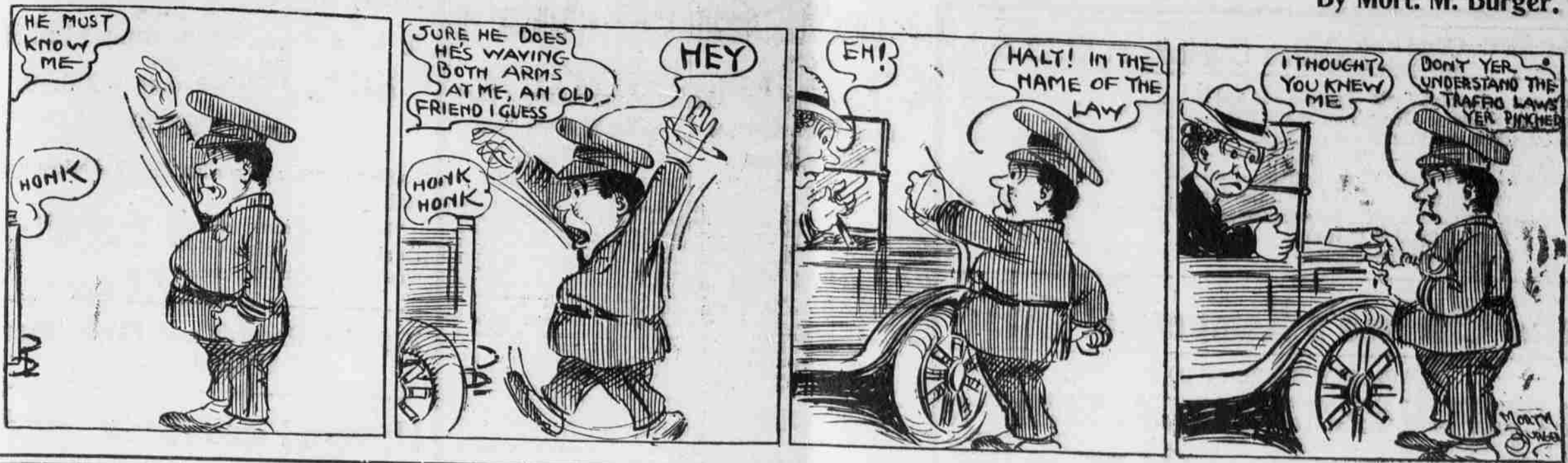

Widow of Single-Taxer Takes Up His Work

Seattle, Wash., Aug. 13.—Mrs. Mary Fels, widow of the late Philadelphia millionaire, Joseph Fels, who is spending a fortune in furthering the single tax movement, is in Seattle today and is scheduled to appear as speaker at three public gatherings. With Mrs. Fels are Daniel Kiefer, secretary of the Joseph Fels fund commission, Dr. John W. Slaughter, of the University of London, England, and Miss Gertrude Huesch, of New York, Mrs. Fels' traveling companion. "Single tax will come," declared Mrs. Fels at the Washington Annex, where the party is staying, "with the close of the war. In no other way can the nations pay their enormous debts. The war will also bring about universal woman suffrage. "The men who are fighting now will return to their homes to find the land taken from the big landlords by the state and will never again bow their necks under the yoke of slavery, as in the past."
