The above is a copy of an announcement issued by the grandfather of Hal D. and E. Cooke Patton, when he opened his hotel on the northwest corner of Liberty and Division streets 63 years ago. For a time the hotel was known as the Cooke house and later was managed by a Mr. Crofts. E. Cooke Patton today received this copy of the announcement from George H. Himes, of Portland, secretary of the Oregon Historical society. Many of the old residents of the city distinctly remember the hotel when it was in charge of Mr. Cooke, who died in 1878.

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO IMPROVE FAIRGROUNDS ROAD FROM THE WEST LINE OF SUMMER STREET TO THE SOUTHERN PACIFIC RAILROAD.

Notice is hereby given that the Common Council of the City of Salem, Oregon, deems it expedient and hereby declares its purpose and intention to forthwith improve Fair Grounds Road from the West Line of Summer street to the Southern Pacific Railroad, with hard surface pavement of the class and character designated by the City Engineer in plans and specifications now on file with the City Recorder as Bituminous Concrete Pavement No. 4. Said improvements to be made at the expense of the abutting and adjacent property within said limits, in accordance with the said plans and specifications for said street improvements, as the same are now on file and as heretofore adopted by the Common Council of the City of Salem under Resolution No. 1467 passed on the 5th day of August, 1915, all of which are on file with the City Recorder and are hereby referred to and made a part of this notice for a more definite and particular description of the limits of said improvement, and of the class and character of the same. Notice is further given that the Common Council, by Resolution duly passed, has rejected all bids for the construction of said improvement and has determined and declared its intention to construct the said pavement with the machinery and tools of the City of Salem under the provisions of Section 25 of the City Charter of the City of Salem, Oregon, as amended and adopted at the general city election held in said city on the 7th day of December, 1914. Written remonstrances against said improvement may be made at any time within Ten (10) days from the final publication of this notice, in the manner provided by the said charter of the City of Salem.
