While Portland is quoting 25 cents for strictly firsts candled eggs, the experience of several who have shipped to commission houses has been very unsatisfactory. There seems to be a method of candling in Portland by which few might come under the heading of firsts, while a greater part of the shipments come under the wire as seconds, at 20 cents a dozen. The live stock market is quiet, and there are no changes in vegetables and fruits.

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO IMPROVE FAIRGROUNDS ROAD FROM THE WEST LINE OF SUMMER STREET TO THE SOUTHERN PACIFIC RAILROAD.

Notice is hereby given that the Common Council of the City of Salem, Oregon, deems it expedient and hereby declares its purpose and intention to forthwith improve Fair Grounds Road from the West line of Summer street to the Southern Pacific Railroad, with hard surface pavement of the class and character designated by the City Engineer in plans and specifications now on file with the City Recorder as Bituminous Concrete Pavement No. 4. Said improvements to be made at the expense of the abutting and adjacent property within said limits, in accordance with the said plans and specifications for said street improvement as the same are now on file and as heretofore adopted by the Common Council of the City of Salem under Resolution No. 1407 passed on the 5th day of August, 1915, all of which are on file with the City Recorder and are hereby referred to and made a part of this notice for a more definite and particular description of the limits of said improvement, and of the class and character of the same.
