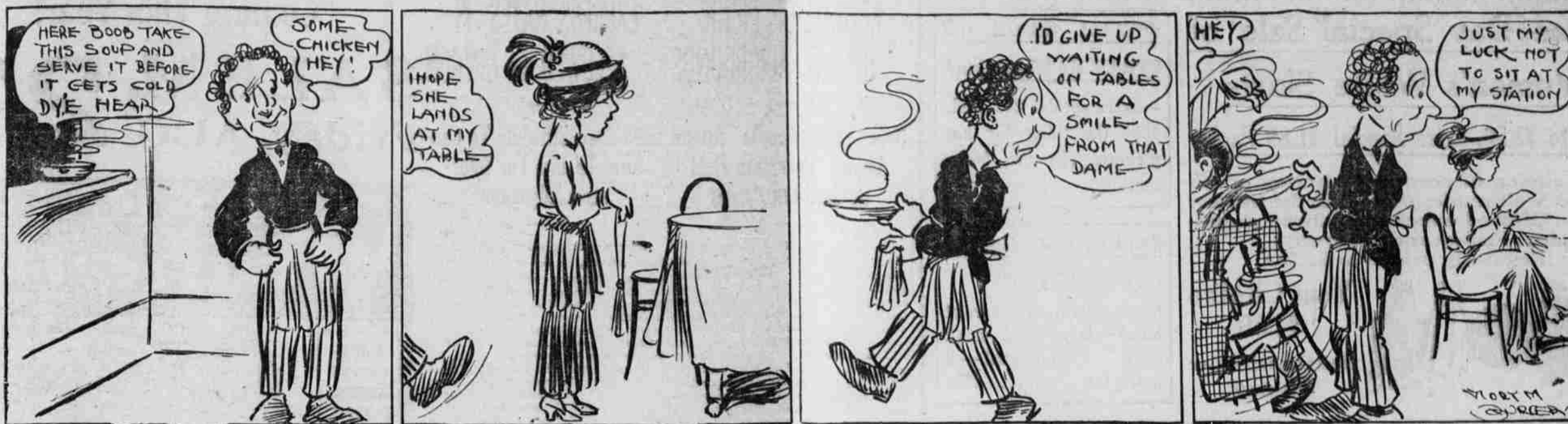

Wheat today is bringing 78 cents as the top price. This decline follows the drop in prices at Portland and Chicago and the news of the touting of the Dardanelles. Other grains are steady. The egg situation is about as follows: Strictly all firsts will bring 22 cents in Salem. Grocers will pay today 19 cents cash or 20 cents in trade, case count. To a certain extent, the grading of eggs as established by the Portland commission men has been unsatisfactory, as the gradings into firsts and seconds rarely brings more than offered by the grocers in case count.
