THE MARKETS
The bears are still on top of the wheat market, and the price today paid by the mills is from 75 to 77 cents. Portland is off several cents today, and this of course pushed the local figures down. There is a general depression in wheat prices in all the big wheat centers of the country. Oats today are quoted at from 32 to 35 cents. This price also is rather uncertain. One warehouse man claimed today to have refused a Portland price equivalent to 38 cents for sacked oats. Other dealers say 32 cents is a high price. With this uncertainty in the market, the farmer who has grain to sell is up against an uncertainty on all sides. One man's opinion is as good as another, and many commission men are afraid to buy on a falling market.

The egg proposition is also unsettled. Some are paying 23 cents cash, and others claim they can buy all they need for 20 cents cash. Retail prices are from 25 to 30 cents. To the average farmer this grading proposition doesn't look very good.
