Eggs are strong, and 25 cents in cash and in trade seems to be the ruling price today. Although several grocers claim they can buy at 23 cents, or can send to Portland and buy for 22 cents cash. But the general trend is for a higher price, and the retail price now is generally 30 cents.

Wheat shows no improvement in prices. The market is dead. One dealer paid 74 cents for 300 bushels yesterday, but the general price based on the Portland market is 75 cents.

Sugar is 20 cents in hundred lower. The cattle market is steady with no especially large amount of trading.

WEEKLY REPORT OF UNION STOCK YARDS

North Portland, Ore., Aug. 31.—The receipts for Monday are: Cattle, 1,187; calves, 5; hogs, 2,799; sheep, 2,304.

CATTLE

Trade opened rather sluggish with a little less than 1,200 head on hand. All lines had a steady outlook. Top steers are again selling at a 7c top. Cows sold at \$5.50 and other lines on the former basis.

HOGS

Twenty-seven hundred hogs were entered for the early morning trading. The feature of the shipping was one consignment of nearly 500 from near Paso, Wash. These were received on the steamer "Twin Cities." River shipments have increased many times in the past year and bids fair to become a very popular means of transporting livestock. Top price for hogs today is \$7.25 with other grades in proportion. Bulk of sales 7c to \$7.10.

SHEEP

Over twenty-two hundred sheep were in but went to a packer contract. Sheep prices are steady with lambs in excellent demand at \$6.50 to an extreme top of \$6.75. Many breeding sheep are going through the yards.
