## BIRTHS AND DEATHS TO BE REGISTERED

### New System Goes Into Effect and District Registrars Are Named

A new system of registering births and deaths went into effect the first of this month. It is compulsory, and was brought about by the passage of the last session of the state legislature by what is known as the "Model Law." Instead of the county health officer keeping a record of births and deaths in the county, these reports are to be made by district registrars, appointed by the state board of health. Where births occur and to physician or midwife is present, a report of the birth must be made within ten days to the local registrar by those interested, and a failure to do this within the specified time will be considered a misdemeanor and is punishable as such. In case of a death, a report must be made by a physician or the family in which the death occurred within 72 hours, and a failure to do this, will also be considered a misdemeanor.

Complying with this new law the following local registrars have been appointed by the state board of health, and it is to those that all births and deaths must be reported:

Salem district, No. 2, Dr. C. E. Gaskett, Salem, Ore. This district includes precincts of Salem, Fair Grounds, Englewood, East Salem, Pringle, Salem Heights, Croston, Liberty, Rosedale, Macleay, Chemawa, Quinaby and Brooks precincts.

District No. 57, Dr. H. A. Beauchamp, Stayton. This includes the precincts of Stayton, East and West Stayton, Sublimity, Amersville and Mehama.

District No. 58, Dr. W. W. Allen, Jefferson. This includes the precincts of Jefferson, Marion and Sidney.

District No. 59, G. W. Beebe, Woodburn. This includes the precincts of East and West Hubbard, Scollard, McVey and East and West Woodburn.

District No. 60, Louis Webert, Aurora. Includes precincts of Donald, Aurora and Butteville.

District No. 61, Dr. R. L. Edwards, St. Paul. Includes precincts of St. Paul and Champe.

District No. 62, Dr. H. O. Hickman, Gervais. Includes precincts of Waconda, Fairfield, East and West Gervais.

District No. 63, Mr. Hubbs, Silverton. Includes precincts of North and Central Howell, North, South, East and West Silverton, Vicer Point, Scotts Mills and Silver Falls.

District No. 64, John T. Bauman, Mount Angel. Includes precincts of Monitor, East and West Mount Angel.

District No. 65, Dr. G. A. Massey, Turner. Includes Turner and precinct of Turner.

## 490 ACCIDENTS ARE REPORTED FOR MONTH OF AUGUST, 1915

Report For Month Exceeds Monthly Average By An Even Hundred Cases

The month of August of this year shows more accidents than any previous month since the State industrial accident commission has been in working order according to the reports of the commission. There were 490 non fatal accidents in this state and four fatal accidents reported for the month. For the 14 months that the commission has been acting there have been 4464 cases reported or a monthly average of 390 which average month of August exceeds by an even hundred cases.
