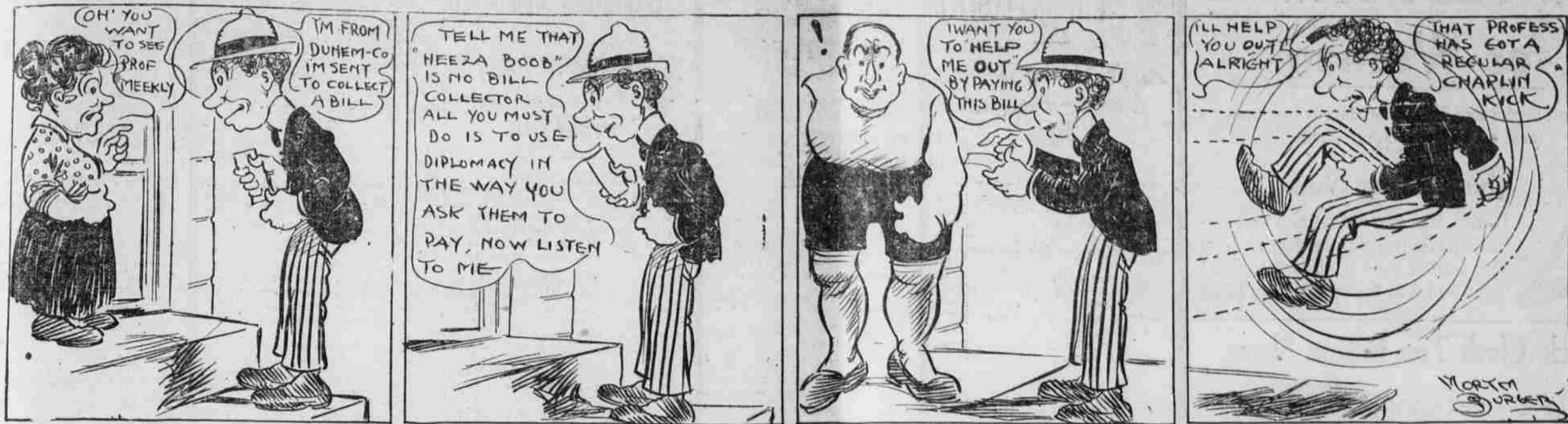

THE MARKETS The wheat market is still on the tenuous, simply because there are no buyers. While several of the wheat men in the city say wheat is now on a cash basis of 72 cents, others claim it is really worth on the market 76c and again others are offering but 70c.

Butterfat and creamery butter both advanced two cents yesterday. Less butter is being offered, and there is a strong demand elsewhere. The egg market seems to have settled down to 23 cents basis cash, and 25 cents for trade, or strictly No. 1, candled. Poultry is scarce and in strong demand.
